Ricky aids Kin CF fight project

Despite some unforescen difficulties, an Acton high school student launched a unique project at Toronto's Sick Children's Hospital last week aimed at boosting public awareness about cystic fibrosis (CF) and helping local Kinsmen raise

funds to fight the disease. Local Kinsman and Acton High School teacher Bill Taylor suggested that 17-

year old Ulricke ("Ricky") Thiel visit Sick Kid's Hospital and experience the dayto-day lifestyle of a CF patient. Photographs taken of Ricky will help the Kinsmen Club of Georgetown promote public awareness of CF and raise funds for

community projects. Ricky told The Herald, though, that "everything that day went wrong".

Lost Wednesday night's revelation about the murder of a baby at the hospital prompted a ban on reporters and photographers at the hospital Thursday.

Ricky was refused access to machines used for testing the lungs of CF patients because the medical staff feared she could develop lung disease. Also, the CF patient whom Ricky was to have observed using the machines failed to appear. Ricky said she feels she is



participating in a worthwhile

"The Kinsmen have done a lot for CF patients," she said. "They funded a research wing at Sick Kid's, and once a year they hold a local dance-a-thon to raise money.

"I felt so sorry for the kids at the hospital. They were there with ordinary colds or flu. With CF, everything is worse."

Ricky plans to continue the project at a future time. "I'm not sure when that will be, but I hope it will be soon," she said. Her brother will take photographs of her using simulated "drugs" and equipment In her own home.

"I'll use bits of carrots and celery sticks for the pills, and drink water in place of the liquid medication," she explained,

Ricky will also use the mask, back massager and other aspects of the kit a CF person uses as part of their daily treatment program. She hopes in that way to provide the Kinsmen with an adequate stide presentation.

Ricky will make another attempt to pose as a cystic fibrosis patient as soon as the equipment is made available to her.

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
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
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
