Magic month for trout

APRIL, the magic month for trout fishermen. The season opens on the 25th of this month, even though the conditions have been perfect in streams around the south of Ontario.

There have been dozens of arrests in the traditional trout spawning rivers and streams around the Owen Sound and Thornbury areas. For your information the mass runs of Rainbow are over and the fish back out in the Bay.

There will surely be some fish still there when the season opens, but don't hold your breath. It is hoped that the rains will hold off for a while and the "alevins" hatch out and are able to hide from strong currents. If this occurs there will be a high survival rate of trout and other gamefish in Ontario this year, and will provide a major boost to the fishery. Let's hope the commercial fishermen don't take advantage of it, and push for higher yields.

Three weeks ago I gave a warning as well as the information to get into some good fishing on Lake Simcoe. The fishing has been great, but March 22nd, 71-year-old Charlie Clark was drowned while walking out to fish off Lefroy. Three volunteer fishermen tried to get him out, and one of them also lost his life.

Now there is talk of keeping ALL fishermen off the ice after the huts are removed on March 15th each year. Randy Bush, the volunteer fireman was buried Friday, (March 27). His father was on the scene of the drowning with him, and the shock is understandable. Randy was only 18 years old.

FISH CONTESTS BIG Contests are getting to be the big thing in fishing these days. This goes along with the great push by beer companies to promote their product over their competitor. I know I will bring condemnation down upon myself for saying this, but why does it have to be a beer company, when our image is bad enough already.

Of course not all beer drinkers are slob members of society, but drinking and boat operation does not mix. That of course goes for liquor as well, and the litter from bottles is incalculable. The one prevalent thing about fishing in Ontario, is the multitude of beer bottles that turn up in our rivers, streams and lakes each year.

If you must drink the stuff, do it at home. There is no need for it out in the wilderness or even at a local stream. If you can not stay away from it that long then you have a problem and should seek advice.

With that out of the way, let me list the contests for you, in case you want to clean up on your prize list: May 29th, 30th, 31st Walleye at Bobcaygeon. May 30, 31, Lake Superior trout hunt, Thunder Bay. June 6, 7 Pike championship Noelville. July 4, 5 Bass at Rice Lake. Sept. 5, 6 Muskie at Lake St. Francis. Sept. 12, 13 Toronto Star Great Salmon Hunt, Lake Ontario.

If you wish further details on any of these contests, drop me a line c/o the Halton Hills Herald. There are others that do not have beer sponsorship. These include the St. Catharines Spring Salmon Derby, Lake Erie Salmon Derby and the Sarnia Salmon Derby. The same information is available on these by writing as above.

NORVAL STOCKED About 300,000 salmon fry were stocked at Norval on March 20. As always I do not make these stockings public until the fish have a chance to spread down stream. There are too many incidences of children catching these fish by the dozens, and that is not good for the fishery, as well as being illegal.

More could be coming or could even have been stocked, but I do not have record of it yet. As promised two weeks ago, a method of preserving salmon or trout eggs (roe) for bait.

Once again I will emphasize I NEVER use spawn for bait, unless it has been preserved commercially, and preferably out of the country. The fact is I can remember when I last used spawn for bait, as the only reason poachers keep at their filthy work is because fishermen buy the eggs for bait.

Catch your own or do without. Lay eggs on several layers of newspaper to dry a little. Sprinkle Borax Powder over and let soak in. Keep adding until it no longer soaks in. Work the borax in and wrap in newspaper and place in fridge for 24 hours. Turn package a couple of times. Add more borax when opened, and place in air tight containers.

If you are making roe bags, or using cut chunks, the same method applies. Next week, another method of curing roe.



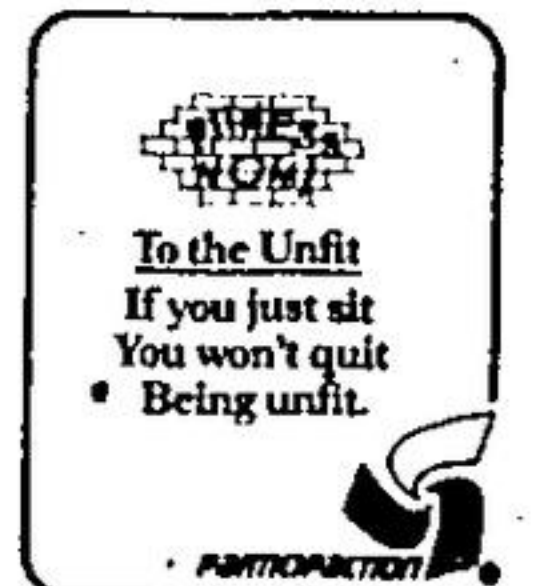
