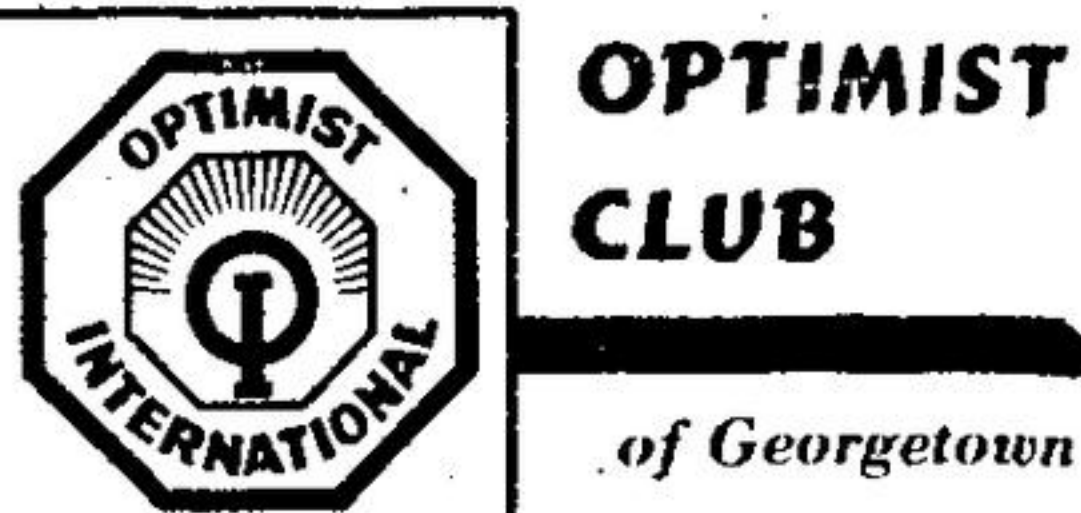
Last year, the committee, whose members include Coun. Marilyn Serjeantson, Agnes Daniell and Caroline

PART 4 - EFFECTS OF MARIJUANA

Marijuana increases the heart rate as much as 50 per cent and can bring on chest pain in people already experiencing a poor blood supply to the heart. Blood pressure also increases significantly and by increasing either heart rate or blood pressure, you increase the amount of oxygen needed by the heart muscle.

Ten puffs of marijuana will increase significantly both the heart rate and the blood pressure simultaneously. But that's not all, marijuana also increases the amount of carbon monoxide in the blood - thereby reducing the amount of oxygen delivered to the heart muscle. It has also been shown to weaken the heart muscle's pumping action.

Marijuana is particularly harmful to the lungs. In one study of humans, it was found that smoking five joints a week over a period of time is more irritating to air passages and impairs the lungs more than smoking six packs of cigarettes a week. Besides the ordinary irritants also contained in tobacco smoke, marijuana smoke contains 50 to 70 per cent greater amounts of carcinogens (cancer-causing agents) than tobacco smoke. In research done on rats, studies show that some lung damage may not be reversible after smoking is discontinued.

Chest pain, emphysema, chronic bronchitis - these are conditions not normally seen in young people. Yet research and clinical evidence strongly suggest marijuana as a cause of these and other early symptoms and diseases of middle and old age. Tobacco smoking is rated the largest preventable cause of death in North America. There are many reasons to believe that marijuana smoking may be even more harmful.



Farm topics at seminar

A special, one-day seminar of interest to area farmers and rural residents takes place April 7 at Hillcrest United Church just south of Ashgrove on Trafalgar Road: fertilizer, sludge and energy conservation will be the topics. Experts will be on hand to explain the latest technology behind soil testing, fertilizer production (in the morning session), applicability of sludge as a fertilizer (a 12:45 to 1:45 session) and heat exchangers, solar panels and reducing tillage (in the later afternoon). Season's magic at Centre

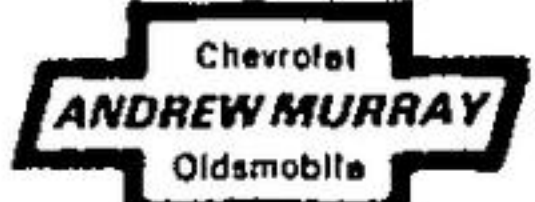

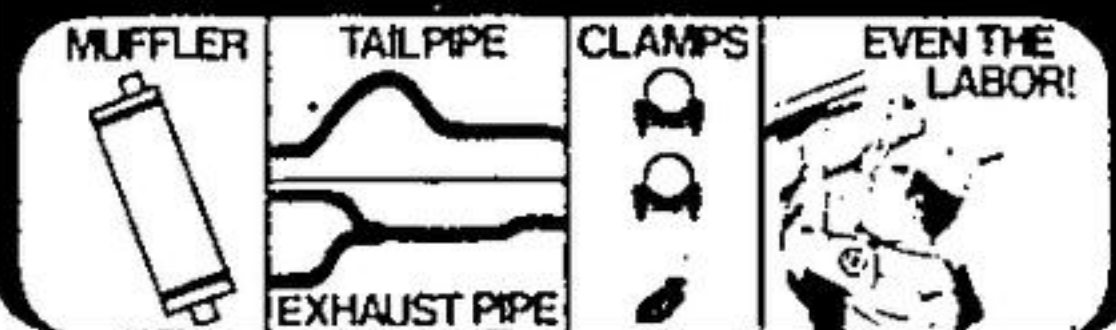

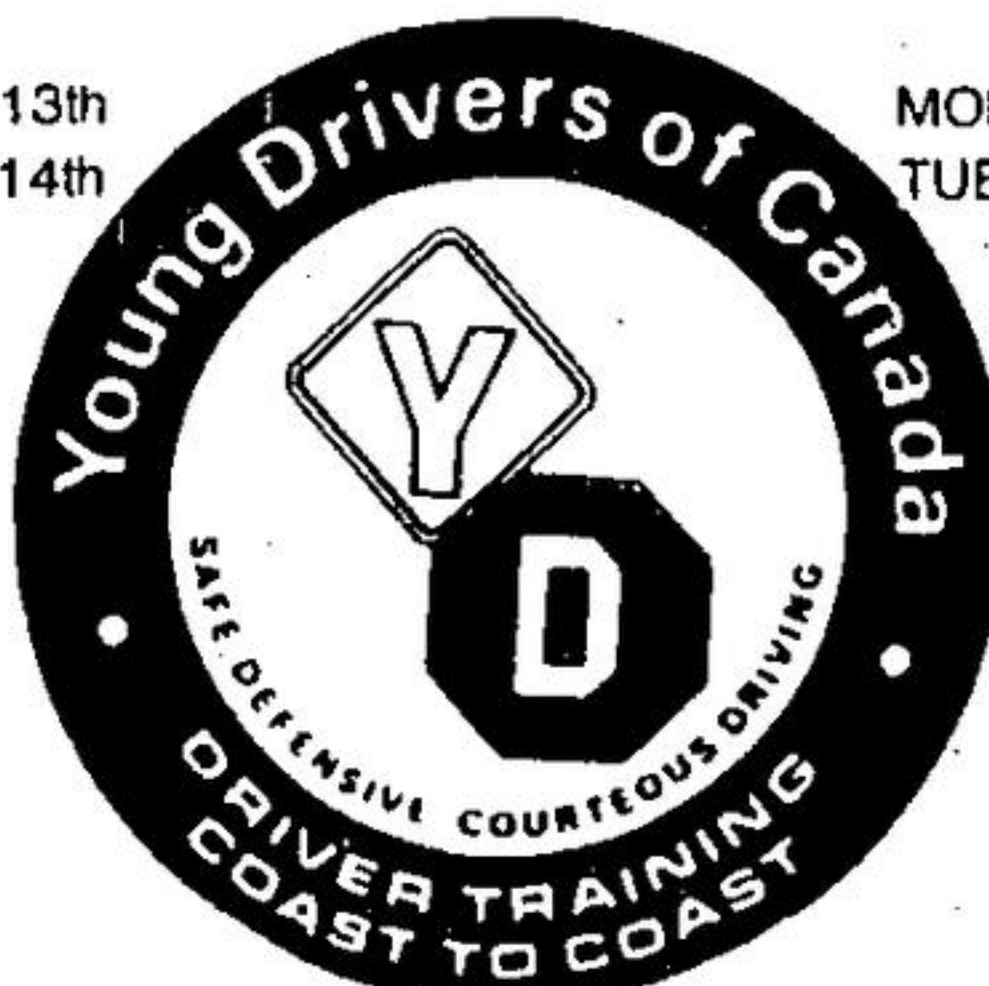
