Signing up for ActiVan

After two years of study and planning, the ActiVan Ad visory Committee has put together the transit service for the disabled. This service, operated by Tyler Transport, is scheduled to begin May 4.

In order to qualify, you must have a disability and your doctor must verify your need for the service. Besides being visibly disabled, on crutches or in a wheelchair, you must have a severe heart, asthmatic, arthritic or seeing problem.

If you wish to become a regular user, you must register, preferably as soon as possible. Application forms may be obtained from your doctor, the Halton Helping Hands, the "Y", the Health Unit, your library, or on request from the driver on the service. The application must be signed by your doctor. Give your signed application to the driver or send it to ActiVan Advisory Committee, c-o Town of Halton Hills, 36 Main St. S., L7G 4X1 (temporarily).

It may be used for shopping, meetings, visiting, medical appointments, to go to school, to work, or anywhere in Halton Hills (the area formerly known as Esquesing Township, including Georgetown and Acton). The rate is 50 cents one way and if you need someone to accompany you, they pay the same price.

Initially, the service will be available weekdays from 9 a.m. to 5 p.m. on an experimental basis. This may change to accommodate the needs of individuals. Bookings must be phoned in before 4 p.m. the previous day, or if possible, set up a regular schedule with the service in advance. In an emergency, you may make one trip without registering, but

for further use, you must register. Be prepared to wait, and share the transportation with others. Inform the service where you wish to be picked up or if you need assistance to leave your building.

Glen man fined

A Glen Williams man has been acquitted on a charge of being an accessory to a Toronto bank robbery, but was sentenced to one day in jail and fined \$100 for possessing stolen money. Randy Lunn, 27, was cleared of the accessory charge, as was David White of Brampton, in a Toronto court March 18. Mr. Lunn's 24-year old brother, David Lunn of no fixed address, was convicted on seven counts of armed robbery and was sentenced to eight years in jail. Convicted of possession of a restricted weapon in the same incident was Kevin Bailey of Toronto, who was fined \$250 and sentenced to three years' probation. James Moore of Toronto will begin a four-year prison term for being an accomplice to armed robbery. The charges, most stemming from a bank robbery in Toronto last summer, were laid after police arrested the men in Georgetown. Picked up in two vehicles, they were carrying \$22,000 in cash at the time.

Long-lost sister still nearby?

Two southern Ontario brothers reunited recently after 34 years' separation are now searching for their sister and the Ballinafad-Georgetown area seems to be the likeliest

Donald Gambell, 34, of Sherbourne Street in Toronto, dropped by The Herald office last week displaying a clipping from a recent issue of the Toronto Star. A photo and article related how Mr. Gambell finally discovered his long-lost brother, 36-year old Thomas Potter, in nearby Hamilton after searching for five years.

The brothers were separated when Mr. Potter was two years old and Mr. Gambell a newborn baby; they hadn't seen or heard from each other since, but now that they're reunited, they're even more earnest about finding their sister, Susan, who was one year old when the children were

Left in the care of the Children's Aid Society (CAS) by financially incapable parents, the three children were adopted by different families, and Mr. Gambell believes Susan may have been brought to a Ballinafad-area home. He told The Herald both he and his sister were adopted by Georgetown families while Mr. Potter went to Oakville; the couple who raised Susan, he believes, were a local physician and his wife who lived in or near Ballinafad but have since departed or died.

Mr. Potter launched a search for his siblings ten years ago, but became frustrated by a CAS refusal to help and the vagueness of what few details he knew of their whereabouts. Mr. Gambell in turn started looking into his own background five years ago, only discovering that he has a brother and sister eight months ago,

Mr. Gambell learned that his brother was raised in Hamilton and contacted every Thomas Potter in the city's phone listings without success. Finally, after learning the surname of his brother's foster parents, he contacted Mr. Potter's foster sister in Hamilton and the reunion was

While Mr. Gambell, a Harbour Castle Hilton hotel supervisor, dreams of posing for a family snapshot with his relocated brother and sister, Mr. Potter cherishes memories of Susan and is all the more keen to find her.

Both brothers declare a loving allegiance to their foster parents and say they would not search for their own parents because "it would be too hard on them".
