Over 700 persons turned up at a seminar in Toronto recently, about a dozen of them from Georgetown, to take part in a variety of workshops on evangelism.

The conference was sponsored by the home mission board of the Fellowship of Evangelical Baptist Churches in Canada, and was held in the well known People's Church on Sheppard Avenue.

The Roman Catholic Archidocese of San Francisco is requiring a six-month waiting period before performing marriages in its 160 parishes. The reason is concern over the rising number of divorces. 
