during the season. With Kentner on the road attending Raider away games or in other hockey rinks scouting hockey prospects it left him precious little time to spend with his wife Gerry and his two children Lori, 15 and Stephanie, 12. Kentner says that his choice for the most valuable member of the Raiders is his wife who supports him all the way in his endeavors. "Gerry is a stabilizing factor between me and the executive. I get encouragement, not nagging," he says.

FEELS THE DREAM

Gerry, who was a director of the Raiders for one year says she basically doesn't like hockey, but feels very supportive towards her husband's hockey job. She says that she feels the dream her husband has of winning a Hardy Cup. "I feel sorry more this year than other years, but I know we will go through it again," she says.

Kentner has in the wind some new ideas for the 1981-82 Raider hockey club. Two advantages that will assist the team's efforts next year is that the OHA championship will be played in the south (hopefully Georgetown) next year and the Canadian championships will be in the East rather than out West.

Kentner's opinion of the 'ideal' club may change in building another team. He thinks next year's team will be strong even though some Raider veterans may leave the team either through their own choice or by the wish of the general manager and coach.

ASK QUESTIONS

Kentner says that in selecting next year's team he will have to ask questions about a player's desire, his motives for playing, his age and physical condition. He agrees that the team should keep the same concept of having a player roster consisting mainly of veterans.

However, if there's one big thing Kentner wouldn't do next year is try for 21 starting hockey players. By this he means that last year experienced pros often created a 'too many chiefs not enough Indians' syndrome.

Kentner would consider bringing in more youth to add some more persistence and energy to the Raider attack. He says the enthusiasm and determination of the younger players spreads to the older players and can have an effect on their play. Conversely, the older players can have a calming effect on the younger players when they are under pressure, the general manager says.
