Ex-police sergeant enforces our bylaws

There are countless bylaws governing the way we live; there are zoning laws, building laws and licensing laws that all must be enforced. But prior to Dec. 1, Halton Hills did not have an employee responsible for the enforcement of these sometimes obscure regulations.

This situation has been remedied since the hiring of Jack Lusty as municipal law enforcement and licensing officer.

Mr. Lusty vacated a similar position in Cambridge to take his present position with the town; he's worked in the field since 1973. Prior to that he was a sergeant on the Preston police force for 10 years.

"The work I do and the work the police do is very similar. The police have different priorities understandably. I look after the areas that sometimes may get overlooked," Mr. Lusty said.

Co-operation with the police is essential in his job, according to Mr. Lusty.

Like a police officer, Mr. Lusty has the power to enforce the law, even if it means taking a person to court.

"I'm basically a public relations man. I would rather discuss a problem sensibly than go to court. Most people would agree."

One of Mr. Lusty's main priorities is the protection of area merchants through a series of licensing requirements. His department ensures that all new businesses pay a standardized license fee to the town.

"This fee is required to protect the existing merchants from some unscrupulous operators. Before we levy the fees, the operator is thoroughly checked out to make sure he's on the level," Mr. Lusty commented.

Mr. Lusty pointed out that he is required to license all businesses, from taxis to a potential electrician planning to open up in the area.

Mr. Lusty believed that the formation of his position is a positive step because it represents some sort of continuity to the town.

"Because I am involved in the infringement of the bylaws from the beginning, and if the case must be presented in court I am there at all times. This has to help for the continuity of the case," said Mr. Lusty.

While Mr. Lusty has the power to ticket and prosecute, he is not provided with the authority to enforce the criminal code.

"There are areas of interest on both sides of the law. I wouldn't step into their (the police) backyard however. What might be Mickey Mouse stuff to the police is serious for me," Mr. Lusty said.

Being an ex-police officer made Mr. Lusty's choice for the position a logical one. He believes he has learned the legal aspects of the job through his police experiences in court.

looking for offences of the bylaws. He acts only after a citizen complains or some other department employee notices an infraction.

Mr. Lusty pointed out that, like the police, he will accept a reasonable explanation from anyone who is found to be breaking a bylaw. "There is no hard-nosed attitude in my job. I see myself mostly as a public relations man."

One of Mr. Lusty's policies is to meet eye to eye with an offender.

"Codes and bylaws can be changed if they are deemed to be unfair. I would rather deal face-to-face with a problem than at arm's length."

At present, Mr. Lusty is

commuting back and forth from Cambridge, but is busy trying to find a home in the area for himself and his wife. He wants to try and keep a low profile, explaining that he got enough publicity when he was a policeman.

"I'm the new boy in town and I wish to stay that way. Throw the roses at the elected people. They deserve and probably welcome the publicity," he commented.

Mr. Lusty professes that going to court is the last avenue of resort for him. He's not trying to scare anyone and plans to continue with his soft-sell approach, he explained.

"After all, slow and steady always wins the race."

We don't need more 'religion'

Halton Hills does not need any more religion. Neither does Canada, nor the world for that matter. In fact there is far too much religion already!

Before you think I have gone atheistic or heretical, let me explain.

What does the word "Religion" mean? It comes from two words: Re - "again", and Ligare - "to bind together, or to tie". Religion is man's attempt to tie himself to God. Consequently, we have thousands of religions representing man's attempts to tie himself back together with God. Religion has given us murder in Ireland and kidnappings by an Ayatollah. Visit California and view new religions being born daily!

Solomon, one of the wisest of men, said "There is a way (singular) that seems right to a man, but the end thereof are the ways (plural) of death." - Proverbs 16:25. At least the word religion recognizes both the breach and the need for a re-connection. But what religion fails to do is connect us; it fails to give relationship. "It is not by works of righteousness which we have done (man trying to tie himself back together with God by his own good works, rituals, ordinances, etc.) but according to His mercy that He saves us." - Titus 3:5.

Man does not need religion. He needs relationship; he needs redemption. I cannot tie myself back together with God, BUT God has tied Himself back together with me. That's what the good news of the Gospel is all about.

There is a separation because of Sin. I do need to be re-connected to God, but not by my religion. Furthermore, the direction of redemption, the offer of redemption is the reverse, it is from God to man. He so loved, (John 3:16) He provided salvation. There is only one mediator between God and man (He tied the knot) the man Christ Jesus. - Titus 3:5, 1 Timothy 2:5-6.

The choicest illustration of the uselessness and hypocrisy of religion is in John, chapter 4. The immoral woman, sinner as she was, had "Samaritan" religion (verse 20). Jesus said she needed God's provided relationship - Jesus the Savior (verses 25, 26 and 42). The answer to man's needs is not the Baptist religion, the Jehovah's Witness religion, the Catholic religion, any religion; it is Jesus Christ (John 4:42), a God-provided relationship, not a man-created religion. Have you believed in Him? Have you received Him? (John 1:12, 14:6). The woman at the well quit being religious (and immoral) and believed in the Lord Jesus Christ. Have you? She did not get religion; she by faith claimed redemption.

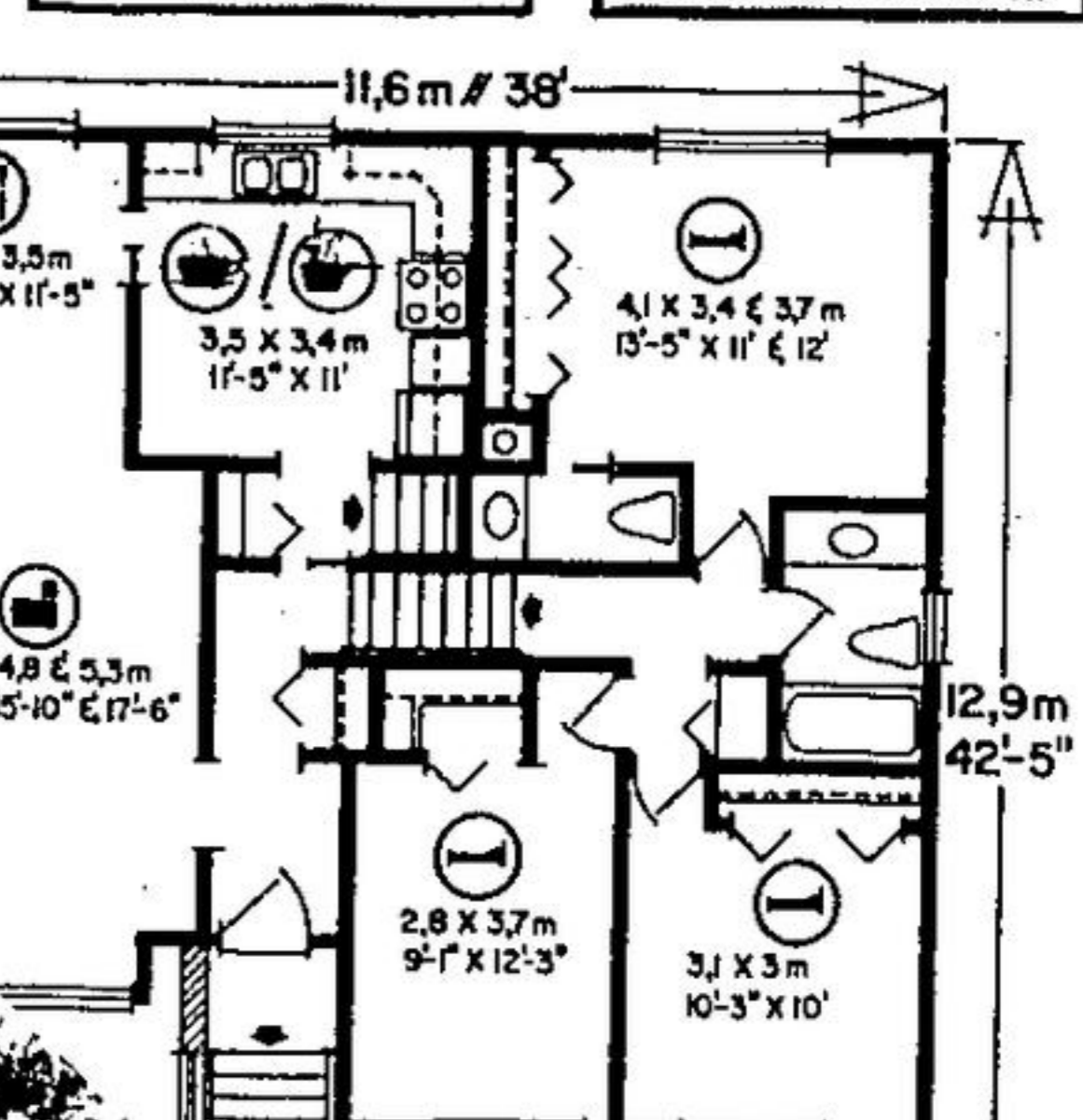

SPACIOUS SPLIT LEVEL WITH PARTIAL BASEMENT

The contemporary exterior is finished in horizontal channel siding and brick veneer, with projecting bay window and shuttered upper-level windows, covered over all with the ever-popular shingle roofing.

The elevated main entry leads into a compact reception foyer and outdoor storage area, from whence traffic moves naturally left into the long rectangular living-dining room combination. The living room features a raised-hearth masonry fireplace and projecting small-paned front windows which lend a formal note to the room. The dining area separates from the kitchen-dinette via convenient pocket door for easy access and excellent separation of formal dining and more casual family meals.

A double enclosed garage with space for the development of a home workshop for the handyman completes the convenience features of this practical and stylish home design.
