

No dumping here

An "interim" garbage dump in Georgetown has been rejected by Halton regional council. The transfer facility, which would have allowed garbage to be dumped temporarily and then hauled to the region's Oakville landfill site, was rejected as "uneconomical". Councillors concurred with a report pointing out that it is still more feasible for loaded trucks to haul their garbage directly to Oakville. instead, the public works department will negotiate an agreement with the town's two refuse collectors to set up small private transfer stations accessible to homeowners and small businesses. A similar facility is already operated by the region at the old landfill site in Georgetown, located on Armstrong Avenue.

The region's solid waste management policies received a credible boost last week. By approving the 1981 capital and operating budgets, regional councillors have established a solid waste management division within the public works department which will be managed by staff in a new position, the solid waste management engineer.


