The winding up of the 1980-81 season is now in the works and our Annual Spring General Meeting will be held April 26th at the Gordon Aleott Hall at 2:00 p.m. Amendments to the Constitution along with election of new officers will be scheduled. Only voting members may vote on any amendments and election of new officers as stated in the Constitution under Article 16, Item 7.

Many countless hours of voluntary work is put into organizing Minor Hockey. This year from 90 registrants and well over 100 coaches and managers we created 54 House League teams, six Select teams and

two girls teams resulting in over 600 hockey games played in town. Your present executive would be more than pleased to see new faces get involved for the upcoming season and make the load lighter.

As noted in a newsletter to all parents at the beginning of the season it was decided to retain the sweaters for this year to assist in restraining operating costs for 1981-82.

The commissioners have stated that some individual sweaters were not returned by their users at the end of the season. These are expensive to replace and we are asking that anyone having one in their possession return it to their coach immediately. The GDHMA logo in the upper left corner of the chest area makes them easily recognizable.

Three hi-lites of the past season were the GDHMA Logo which gives the organization recognition, the birth of the Association's Coaches and Managers manual which is being reviewed by other organizations and the break-out of the Select teams into a league of their own on a trial basis.

We will know by April 24th, or thereabouts, the OMHA's decision on whether we will be allowed to run the Select league as it was this season.

The past two years as President of the GDHMA has been very interesting, to say the least, working with the commissioners, coaches, managers and other executive members for the boys and girls involved in Minor Hockey and hope to see you all at our General Meeting.

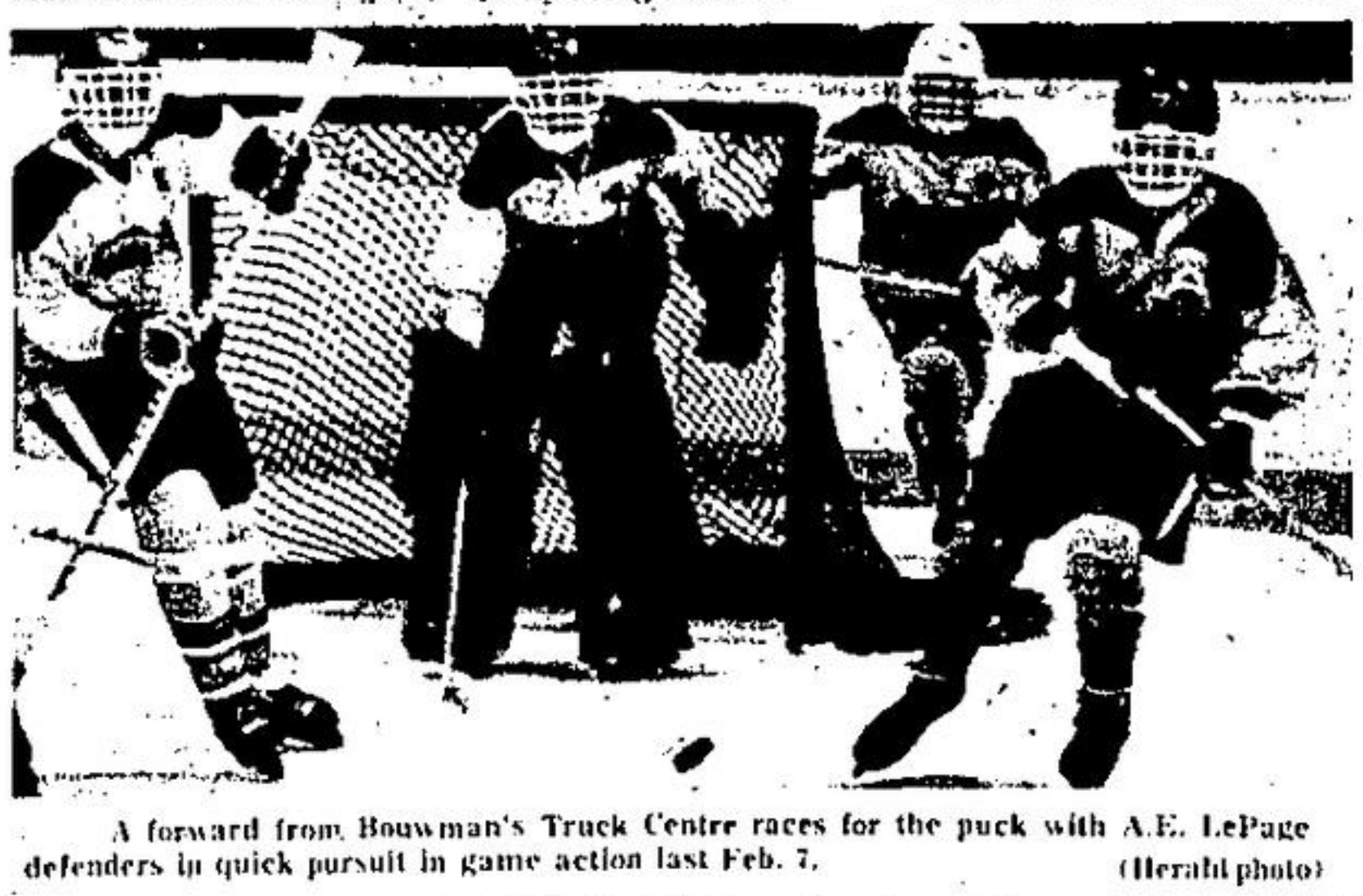
