# Arts complex drive 'bowls' ahead

Although the final tally, after expenses, will not be known for at least another week while bowlers collect their individual pledges, there was no doubt that the Bowl-A-Thon - a first for the Georgetown club -- was a great

In addition to the six teams which took part from Georgetown Rotary, there were teams also from the Georgetown Rotary-Anns and the Rotary Club of Acton, Mayor Pete Pomeroy captained a council team which included Ross Knechtel, celebrating his 70th birthday that day. The media was represented by teams from Halton Cable and The Independent, the latter featuring guest Rex Heslop (chairman of the town's fund-raising committee).

Georgetown and District High School had three teams comprising of those about to go on a federal government exchange program to Newfoundland, while another team of youngsters calling themselves "The Bugs" also provided much youthful zest. Two teams of "master bowlers" ensured that at least some of the scores would be respectable -- perhaps compensating in some measure for the enthusiastic, if often erratic, bowling of two teams from Georgetown Little Theatre, which included half




