Local girl wins MVP award

Georgetown's Sue Alexander's maturity and attitude earned her a share of the most valuable player award in women's volleyball at Sheridan College this year.

Alexander, along with co-winner Gail Wolstenholme, were presented the award at Sheridan's 13th annual Athletic Awards Banquet held recently at the Hansa German Canadian Club.

The second-year business administration student transferred from the University of Waterloo to captain a Cinderella volleyball squad which reached the final of the Ontario Colleges Athletics Association championships.

"She's a very intelligent player," coach Hal Watson said, "and has as fine an attitude as I've ever seen in coaching, and I've done a lot of coaching."

Sue was part of the Sheridan Women's Volleyball team that took part in the OCAA provincial championship at Mohawk college during the second week of March. Her team lost the championship final against the Seneca Scouts.

Seneca beat the Sheridan team, who finished with a 4-1 record in the round robin, 15-12, 10-15, 17-15, 11-15 and 15-8 in the final.



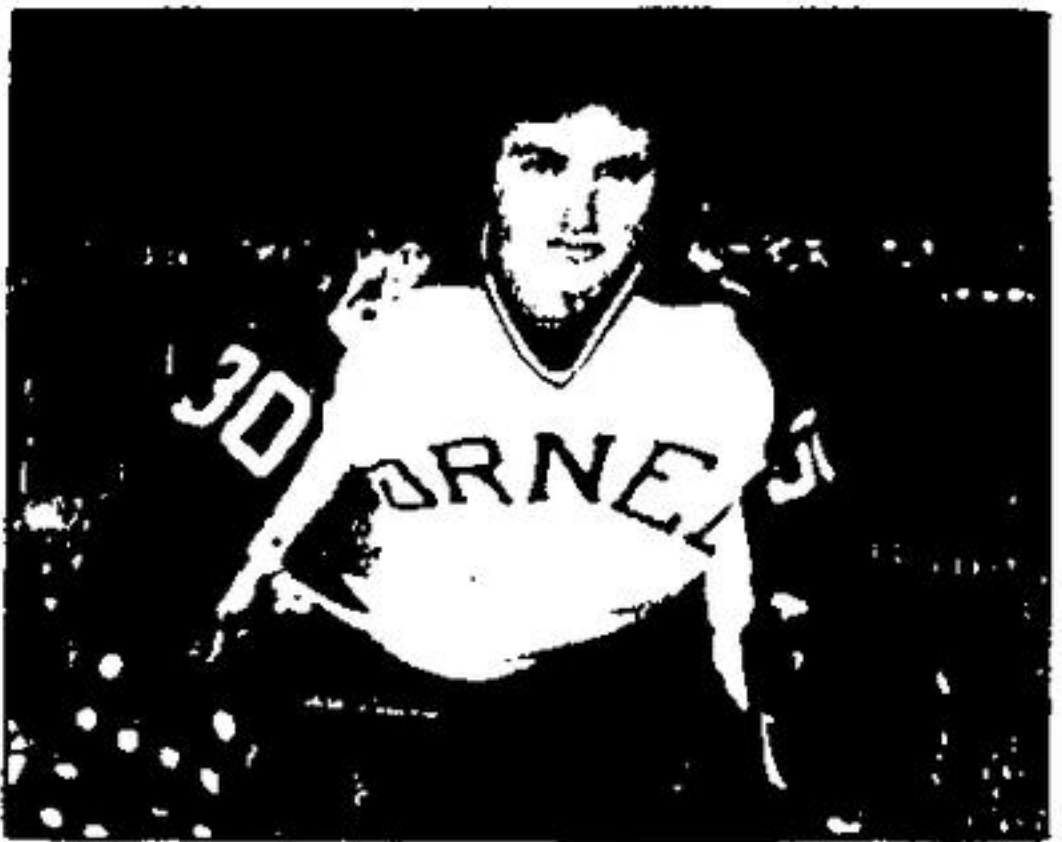
Gary Richardson has been in the money recently for his bowling expertise as he set an Ontario record for the most money won for a young adult bowler. (Herald photo)

Georgetown has a record-setting young adult bowler in its midst. Gary Richardson who just recently set a record in Ontario for the most money made while on the young adults bowling circuit.

Richardson, 22, still has two bowling tournaments left to go before his bowling schedule winds down. In Welland there will be the provincial handicapped team final and May 9 and 10 the Tournament of Champions will be held in Toronto.

Brian Hayward of Georgetown was named a tri-captain for the 1981-82 Cornell hockey season. Hayward, a third year veteran of the team is their standout goaltender.

He posted a 3.54 goals against average, a .904 save percentage and stopped 535 shots in 19 games en route to a 11-4-1 record. Cornell finished the 1980-81 season first in the Ivy Region of the ECAC Division I teams, second in the ECAC championship tournament and posted a 19-11-1 overall record.

Hayward played minor hockey in Georgetown until he was 14. He played midget hockey with the Marlborough organization as well as playing for the Markham Waxers and Don Mills Flyers.

The Georgetown Junior B Geminis were well represented at this year's OHA convention in Toronto last weekend in which policy affecting the Central League was discussed.

Bob Girdwood, Brian James, Bob McCandless Jr. and coach Dave Switzer represented Georgetown and aired their views on recent developments.

One of the more interesting topics for the Junior B's was the discussion of the use of facemasks. It seems that each of the Junior A, B, C and D categories of the OHA will be able to vote on whether facemasks will be worn. Even if Georgetown votes against facemasks they must abide by the general census of the Junior B category which takes in votes from the Metro West, Central North, Mid West North, Metro East, Central South (Georgetown, Acton), Hosi...shoe and Mid-West South.

FOOD MART SPONSOR

It was unveiled that Miracle Food Mart will be sponsoring a Junior B tournament in Kitchener over the Christmas holiday next year and each division will send an all-star team. Therefore Acton and Georgetown would more than likely send some representatives from their teams. Miracle Food Mart will also sponsor the overall Junior B champions, the Burlington Cougars on a trip to Europe in August but Burlington must still raise nearly \$21,000 for the trip themselves.

Also affecting the Junior B league is a rule that says only officials over 18 years of age can participate in league games. This means that referees and goal judges cannot be minors. Bob Girdwood, past president of the Geminis thinks this rule is good because the league had six referees who were under 18 last year and they were often physically weaker than the players whom they had to restrain in fight situations.

One rule change that might help or hurt the Geminis depending on the status of the arrangement is that of hockey players from the United States. At this point Bob Girdwood says the situation is still up in the air but if the status quo remains, Georgetown could bring in a couple of solid hockey players from the States and they would not be considered imports.

RULE CHANGE

It was also decided that you cannot call for a stick measurement after a goal has been scored as was done before. You now have to wait until the next stoppage of play. A player will still be penalized but the goal will stand.

To counter physical frustration at the end of the game the OHA have proposed that all players receiving a 10 minute misconduct will automatically sit out the next game.
