

Council backs Elks effort

 May is Hearing and Speech Month and Mayor Pete Pomroy of Halton Hills has designated this Saturday (May 2) as Elks Purple Cross Deaf Detection Day.

The Elks and their auxiliary, the Order of the Royal Purple in Halton Hills are planning a Tag Day Saturday to publicize the work that the Orders are doing in the field of the hearing impaired. The Elks and the Order of the Royal Purple raise funds to continue the work of their national program, the Elks Purple Cross Deaf Detection and Development Program.

Across Canada, the Elks and the Order of the Royal Purple have committed themselves to a national program which promotes the earliest possible identification of hearing impairment and assists in providing the best possible services to the hearing impaired Canadian child. Since the inception of this program, in 1967, the Elks and the Order of the Royal Purple have expended over \$2 million dollars for "hearing programs" in Canada.

THE PROCLAMATIONS
WHEREAS: The B.P.O. Elks and their auxiliary, the Order of the Royal Purple, have established a program to bring about the earliest possible identification of the hard of hearing child by continuing to search out ways to assist in the detection, development and rehabilitation of the hard of hearing child; and

WHEREAS: Such detection and development in infancy is vitally important if appropriate assistance in developing language and



speech are to be provided; and

WHEREAS: Assistance is needed in coordinating and upgrading all programs in Canada in their continual campaign to search and find this hidden handicap in Canadian children through continued coordination and consultation with qualified professionals in the area of hearing and speech impairment; and

WHEREAS: The Elks and their auxiliary, the Order of the Royal Purple, endorse May as Hearing and Speech Month in Canada and have designated the first Saturday in May as their "public information day";

NOW, THEREFORE, I, the Leading Knight of Halton Hills Elks 540 DO HEREBY PROCLAIM Saturday, May 2, 1981, as "Elks Purple Cross Deaf Detection Day", and urge all citizens to support the objectives of the Elks Purple Cross Fund.

PROCLAMATION
WHEREAS: The B.P.O. Elks and their auxiliary, the Order of the Royal Purple, established at the 1967 convention a program to be known as the Elks Purple Cross Deaf Detection and

Development Program; and **WHEREAS:** such program was established to bring about the earliest identification of the hard of hearing child by continuing to search out ways to assist in the development and rehabilitation of the hard of hearing child; and

WHEREAS: such detection and development in infancy is vitally important if appropriate assistance in developing language and speech are to be provided; and

WHEREAS: assistance is needed in coordinating and upgrading all programs in Canada in their continual campaign to search and find

this hidden handicap in Canadian children through continued coordination and consultation with qualified audiologists, speech pathologists, educators of the deaf, medical and professional agencies, and educational programs,

THEREFORE, do I, the Mayor of Halton Hills authorize the Elks Purple Cross Flag to be flown over our (community-city) during the month of May, known as Hearing and Speech Month, in recognition of the valuable work of these Orders.

SPACIOUS COUNTRY-STYLE SPLIT LEVEL

This dramatically rustic yet elegant split level home design is best suited to the wide frontage urban or suburban building lot. It provides in excess of 1,800 square feet of well-organized finished floor area, for present use, and possesses two large un-finished areas which total more than 600 square feet of additional living accommodations. A partial basement under the living room provides even more space for recreational facilities or merely for storage space.

The exterior combines a modified mansard-style roof with elements of the western ranch house to create an impression of a rural estate. Mixed horizontal and vertical channel siding area complemented by twin brick chimneys and heavy shake roof; and twin dormers and a projecting bay window lend a sense of urbane elegance.

The wide frontage gallery provides excellent weather sheltering for the double-doored main entry, which lead into a spacious reception foyer and outerwear storage area. The commodious un-finished area adjacent to the foyer would make an excellent lounge and recreation room; or could be finished as a more formal library/office for the business-oriented family. Access to the partial-basement is gained via hall-stairway from the rear of this un-finished area.

From the foyer traffic moves up three steps and left into the long rectangular living-dining room combination. The living room features a raised-hearth masonry fireplace and a wide projecting bay with elegant diamond-paned windows. The dining area has French doors leading onto a wide rear balcony.

The kitchen-dinette combination may be completely isolated via convenient pocket doors for privacy and hygiene. It is an extended U-shape, with generous counter-top work surfaces and a step-saving work triangle configuration.

Three steps down from the kitchen lies the laundry-utility complex and vanity bath, which provides abundant laundry and other storage facilities. Adjacent to this complex is the spacious un-finished family room/TV lounge. The family room features a second raised-hearth masonry fireplace and twin sliding glass walk-throughs leading to the rear patio.

Adjacent to the family room is situated a compact mud room area, from whence two steps lead down to the double enclosed garage; to the rear of which is positioned an enclosed tool storage facility which would make an excellent workshop for the home handyman.

All four bedrooms are positioned on the upper level, around the central bathroom and linen storage closet. Each has excellent exposure for view and natural light, and each has generous closet storage facilities. The luxuriously spacious master bedroom has double closets and a large three-piece ensuite bathroom with an interior garden provided by the dormer windows.

Plans for design No. 81-1783 may be purchased either by the single set, at a cost of \$110.00 for the first set and \$20.00 for each additional set, or by the package. A live-set plan package, including the first set, is economically priced at \$185.00 and an eight-set package, also including the first set, is only \$200.00.
