Rotary trade fair May 28-30

Industry '81 coming all 130 booths sold

Herald Special Industry '81 - an industrial trade show scheduled for next month in Brampton - is gaining momentum in the local business community.

Lou Duggan, area chairman, said almost all of the 130 booths have been sold to exhibitors for the three-day event.

The show to be held May 28, 29, 30 at Century Gardens, is co-sponsored by the Brampton and Georgetown Rotary Clubs.

The trade show is designed to showcase and promote the many services, manufacturing and trade type industries in Brampton and Georgetown.

"We want the public to come out," said Mr. Duggan. "But it's our primary concern to bring out customers and suppliers."

The combined industrial show will also try to bring together large and small industries in the Brampton and Halton Hills areas, some

of whom may not know the other exists.

The show will be open to the public Friday evening from 5 until 9 and Saturday morning. The remaining hours will be reserved for industries, suppliers and potential users of displayed products.

Each 100-square-foot booth comes with a price tag of \$240 for the days of the show.

Mr. Duggan said he is "pleased" with the response and hopes the show will become an annual event.

"We would like to keep it in Brampton," concluded Mr. Duggan. "It is needed for community identification."

Regional reps need privacy

The need for more privacy encouraged Halton region's finance and administration committee to approve a proposal creating a larger, more secluded library-lounge for regional councillors.

Originally estimated to cost almost \$3,000, committee members asked that regional staff furnish the room, as much as possible, with desks, shelves and filing cabinets already unused in the regional building on Oakville's Bronte Road. The smaller library will be changed into an additional committee room.

Committee members pointed out that they need a place at regional headquarters to study reports without being disturbed by the steady traffic of staff members and the press.

Located on the building's second floor, the new library would feature two circular tables, three desks, shelves, sectional couches and phone hook-ups. Councillors using the room would be close to the secretarial services of the regional chairman's office.

In addition to creating the extra lounge and adding a committee room, Halton Hills Coun. Dave Whiting suggested that holes be bored into the walls or doors of the committee rooms adjacent to council chambers to allow television cords to pass from room to room without leaving doors ajar.

Coun. Whiting explained that the privacy of council when it moves into closed sessions and excludes the press may occasionally be jeopardized by having to leave the doors open slightly.

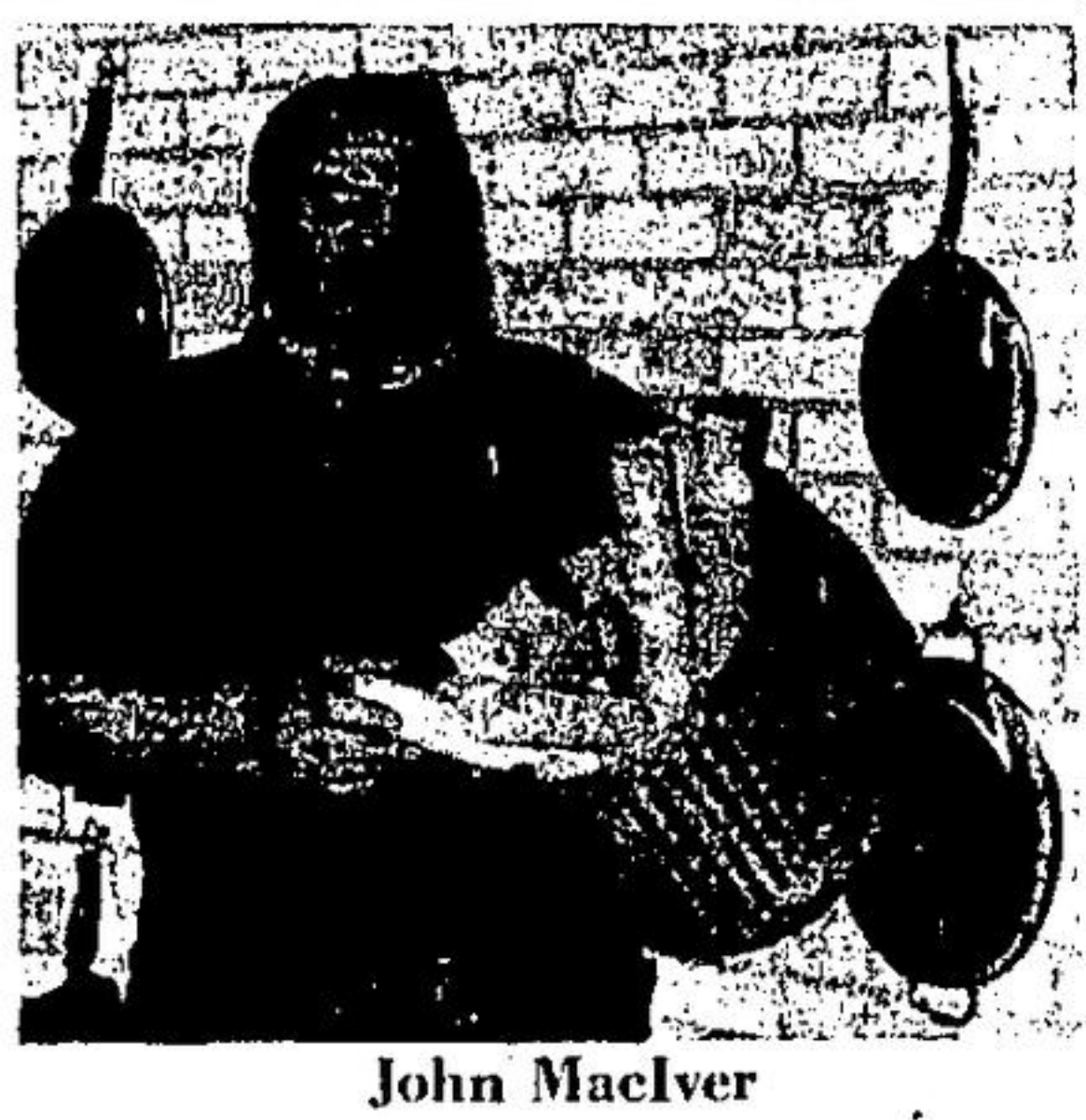
A gourmet's paradise

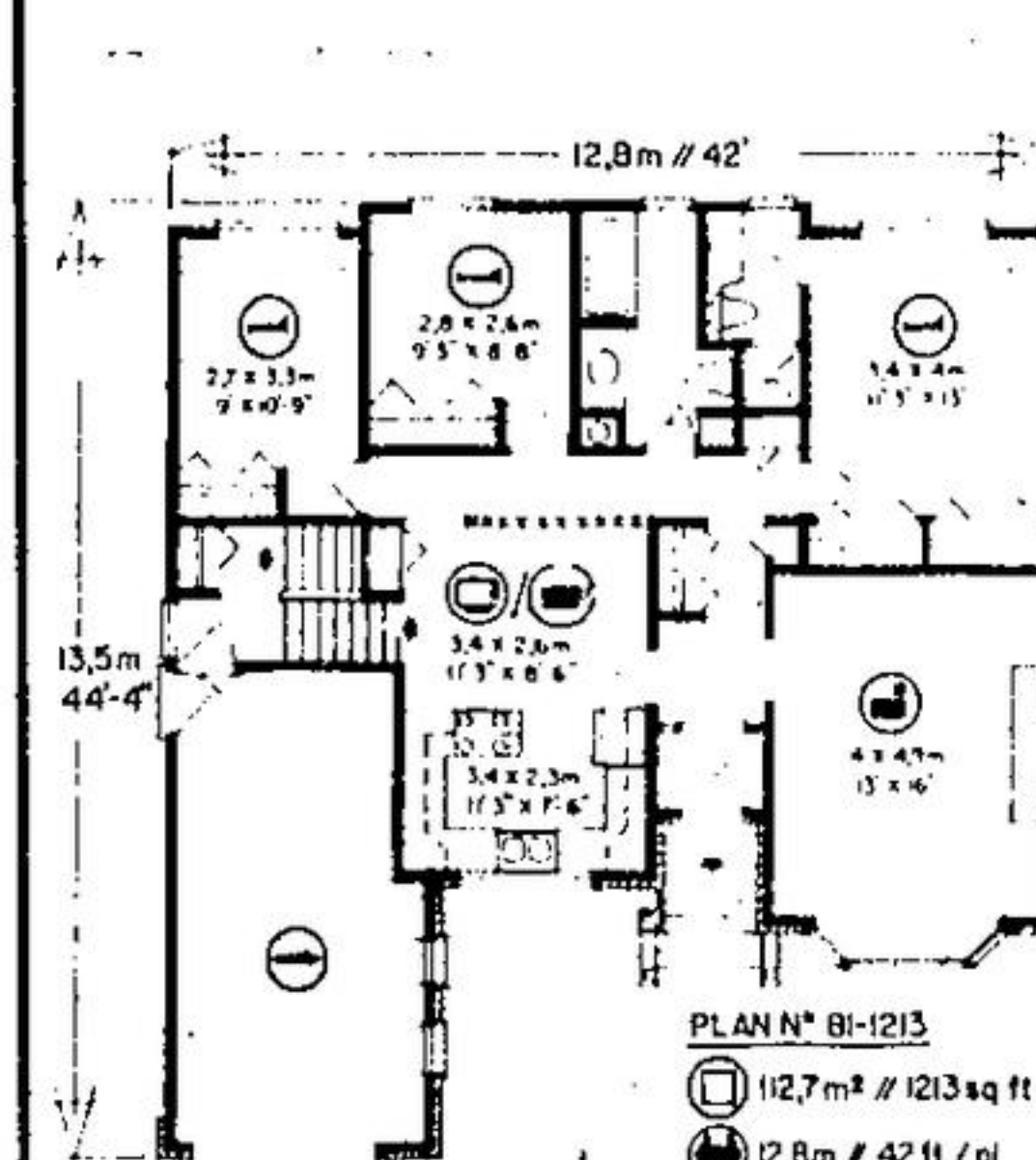

TRADITIONAL BRICK BUNGALOW WITH FULL BASEMENT

This three bedroom brick bungalow is perfectly suited to the medium fringe area and provides in excess of 1,200 square feet of well-organized finished floor area, for present use, and enables almost as great an amount of living accommodation to be developed in the full basement at some future date. The attractive exterior is finished in Tudor-style stucco and board trim, with brick facade, chimney and accents. The heavy shake roof could be alternately finished in shingles, according to individual family preference and regional material costs.

The elevated main entry leads into an energy-conserving vestibule, which functions as an "air-lock" between the outdoors and indoors, to maintain the indoor temperature. The vestibule opens into a compact reception foyer and outdoor storage area, from

which traffic moves naturally to the right, into the long rectangular living room. The living room features a raised-hearth masonry fireplace for convivial "athomes", and a formal but charming bay window which could be finished with an interior window seat for those whose decor tastes lean toward the traditional.

A well-planned closed U-shape kitchen/dinette combination provides a stop-saving work triangle and figurative, generous counter-top work surfaces and abundant cupboard storage. The dinette area contains ample space for the use of a standard-size dining suite, but invites the custom installation of built-in banquette-style nook furnishings. An optional spindle screen wall separates the dining area from the bedroom area, thus dividing the formal from the private areas of the interior. Stairs from the dinette area lead down to the compact

mud room facility and to the full basement.

The single-car garage contains ample space for the installation of a workbench for the home handyman, and provides a convenient access to both the side of the home and the mud room area.

All three bedrooms are positioned to the rear of the floor plan and well away from the main entertaining area, for freedom from disturbance. Each has generous closet storage and good view and natural light to the rear of the site. The large master bedroom has full-width closet storage and a three-piece ensuite bathroom with shower.

This is an excellent home plan, offering the young family a highly practical and liveable interior layout in an eye-catching and enduring exterior finish.
