Run for the Honey is on Mississauga race June 6

Dust off those running shoes. There's only 32 days to prepare for the third annual Streetsville Bread & Honey Festival 15 Kilometre Race on Saturday, June 6.

Last year's edition of the Bread & Honey race - also known as the Run for the Honey - attracted over 650 entrants, making it Mississauga's largest participation race.

After last year's heavy turnout, the Credit Valley Marathon Club (CVMC), which organizes the race in conjunction with The Mississauga Times, has put the start of the race back to 8:30 a.m. to ensure improved race control by Peel police.

Entrants who get their entries to race organizers by May 25 will receive a race package through the mail. The race package will include a map, a race sticker and an entry tag to allow the competitor to use dressing rooms at Vic Johnston arena before the race. With the race package, runners will not have to line up before the race to pre-register.

Once again The Times Trophy will be presented to the first competitor to finish the 9.3 mile course, which this year begins at the entrance to Reid Milling, 27 Reid Drive, and finishes on Church Street next to Vic Johnston arena. The first 500 entrants in the race

will receive complimentary Run for the Honey T-shirts courtesy of The Times. For all finishers there will be framed certificates indicating the finisher's placing and time.

Trophies will be awarded to the overall winner and fastest woman. Medallions will be given to the top three in men's and women's junior, open and masters divisions.

Complete results will be published in the June 10 edition of The Times.

Dean Foster of the Toronto Olympic Club won in 1980 in a time of 47 minutes three seconds. Kathie Tanner was the top woman, finishing in 58:16. In 1979, Mississauga's Rick Chase won in a time of 48:32.

Entry fee for the race is \$4. Post entry fee is \$8.

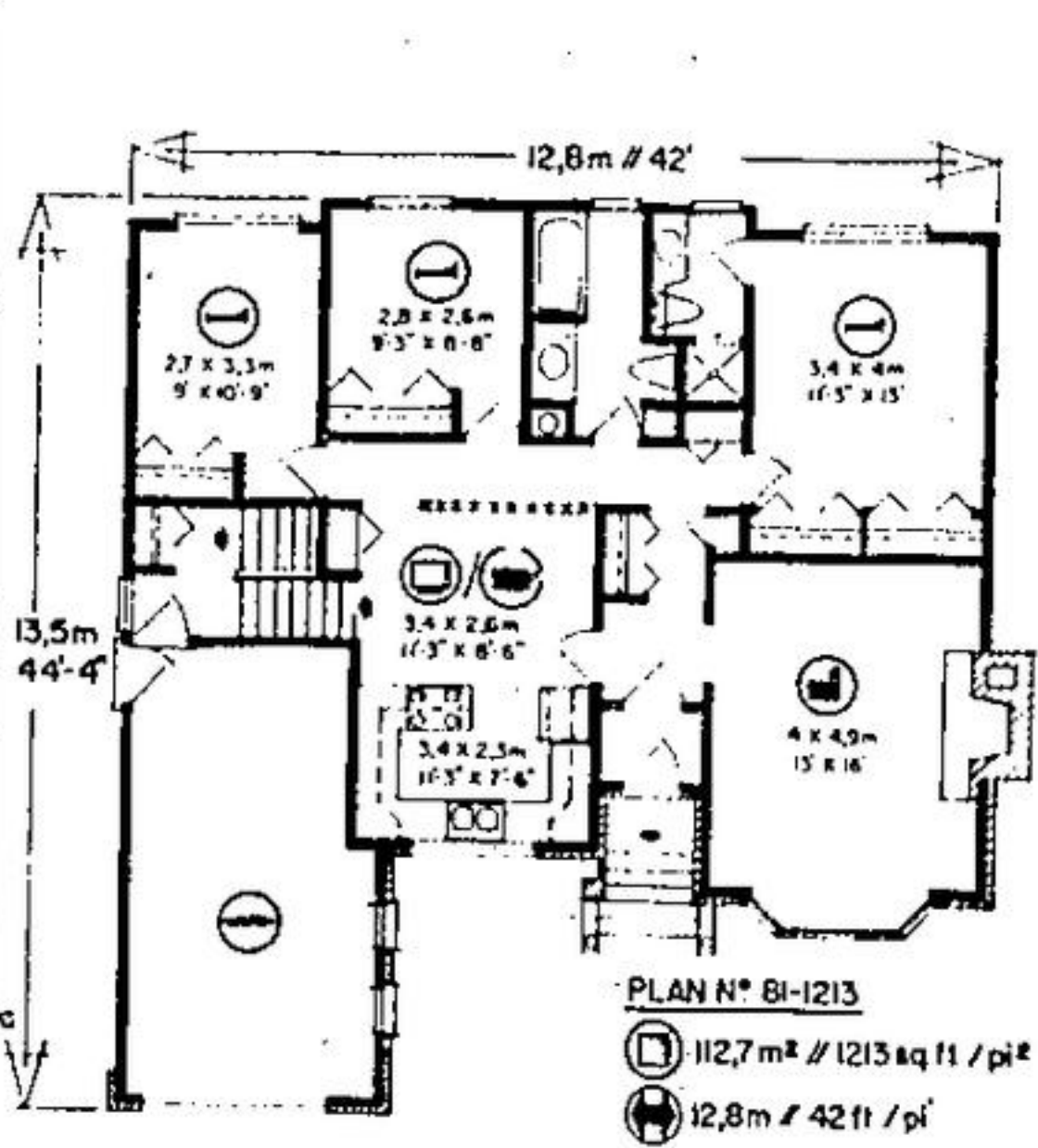

TRADITIONAL BRICK BUNGALOW WITH FULL BASEMENT

This three bedroom brick bungalow is perfectly suited to the medium frontage urban residential building lot and provides in excess of 1,200 square feet of well-organized finished floor area, for present use, and enables almost as great an amount of living accommodation to be developed in the full basement at some future date. The attractive exterior is finished in Tudor-style stucco and board trim, with brick facade, chimney and accents. The heavy shake roof could be alternately finished in shingles, according to individual family preference and regional material costs.

The elevated main entry leads into an energy-conserving vestibule, which functions as an "air-lock" between the outdoors and indoors, to maintain the indoor temperature. The vestibule opens into a compact reception foyer and outerwear storage area, from which traffic moves naturally to the right, into the long rectangular living room. The living room features a raised hearth masonry fireplace for convivial "at-homes", and a formal but charming bay window which could be finished with an interior window seat for those whose decor tastes lean toward the traditional.

A well-planned closed U-shape kitchen/dinette combination provides a step-saving work triangle configuration, generous counter-top work surfaces and abundant cupboard storage. The dinette area contains ample space for the use of a standard-size dining suite, but invites the custom installation of built-in banquette-style nook furnishings. An optional spindle screen wall separates the dining area from the bedroom area, thus dividing the formal from the private area of the interior. Stairs from the dinette area lead down to the compact

mead room facility and to the full basement.

The single-car garage contains ample space for the installation of a workbench for the home handyman, and provides a convenient access to both the side of the home and the mud room area.

All three bedrooms are positioned to the rear of the floor plan and well away from the main entertaining area, for freedom from disturbance. Each has generous closet storage and good view and natural light to the rear of the site. The large master bedroom has full-width closet storage and a three-piece ensuite bathroom with shower.

This is an excellent home plan, offering the young family a highly practical and livable interior layout in an eye-appealing and enduring exterior finish.

Plans for design No. 81-1213 may be purchased either by the single set, at a cost of \$110.00 for the first



set and \$20.00 for each additional set, or by the package. A live-set plan package, including the first set, is economically priced at \$185.00 and an eight-set package, also including the first set, is only \$200.00.
