Jon finds close races more to his liking

Jon Cornwell of Georgetown won a "split decision" at Welland County Speedway Saturday night in his first Canadian dirt track appearance after riding in Florida and California. Cornwell fought off the charge made by the current Canadian short-track champ, Chris Evans, to put his Inglis Cycle Centre-Miracola sponsored 250 Yamaha over the finish line half a bike length ahead of Evans. The two riders fought back and forth throughout the race and had the spectators on their feet screaming. Canada's half-mile champ, Peter Grant struggled in a distant third on a borrowed machine. In the 500 class the order was reversed. Another ding-dong battle between Evans and Cornwell saw Evans take the checkered flag, with Cornwell nipping at his heels

while Mike Kelly of Hamilton came home in the show position. Cornwell and Evan exhilarated by their wins agreed that "close racing like this is best - it really gets the old adrenalin going!" Commented Cornwell, "I'm glad I'm back in Canada - I missed this kind of action in the States."

TILLSONBURG FAIRGROUNDS: Canadian racers watched in frustration as three hot-shot American riders carried off the premier awards in all three expert classes at the Tillsonburg half mile.

Jon Cornwell fought valiantly to hold on to the coat tails of Brian Hardin of Michigan as he ran away with the 250 class.

Cornwell and Evans again battled it out for 2nd place switching positions several times before Cornwell, stret-

ched out over his bike's tank and beating its flank with an imaginary whip skinned over the finish line ahead of Evans.

The 500 cc class saw 15 year old Charles Bowles of Michigan run away from the charge put on by Chris Evans. Cornwell's 500 Yamaha broke its exhaust pipe in the semi and kept him out of the final.

WOODSTOCK FAIRGROUNDS: History repeated itself. Once again the Americans ran away with the first place finishes in the three expert classes.

Cornwell again chased Hardin's noticeably faster 250 over the finish line once again followed by Chris Evans. Charles Bowles dominated the 500 class, followed by Hardin with Cornwell taking the checkered flag third.
