Collecting lures more popular

Someone asked me recently what is the best method of fishing for walleye. As this is an oft asked question, I guess I had better try to answer it intelligently.

From the top, let me say that what works for one fisherman may not work for another. The reasons vary from speed to smell on the lure and everything between. All I can do here is give the basics to form your own experiments, and what has worked for me and others.

Personally I would take along three rods; a good spinning rod and open face recl with two spools...one for two pound test line and the other with six pound test. My second rod would be one to match the new Zebco model 154 reel that is a cross between spinning and spin cast. This outfit would contain eight pound test line as it would be used at night, where line tangles would thus be eliminated, and heavier line could be used.

Also my favorite casting rod and level wind rool would go along as I simply love to fish with it. After much thought and past experience my fly rod would go along on the trip loaded with a fast sinking tip line to get me into 10 feet of water quickly with a minnow imitator streamer. These can be red hot at times. Two pound test line with size eight eagle claw aberdeen bronze hook with a flat dew worm hooked through the nose only is probably the all round best bet to take walleye. Other live bait of course is minnows and the same small hooks should be used.

In this way your balt will have a more natural freedom, to attract fish. Lures: in a spinner I would use nothing but a Mepps and they come in a variety of sizes and accessories. For plug fishing use the Ralala traditional minnow or the Fat Rap series in colors to represent the balt fish prevalent in the area.

I have caught walleye on a variety of other plugs, but the Ralala's are so superior that I would stick to them exclusively. Of course I have been known to throw everything in my box in a two hour period, and if you were to see the size of my box, you would wonder how or why.

Pike have been hitting well in Fairy Lake in Acton, and a recent phone call from a reader in Acton told of a four pound and an eight pound pike coming to the net. The reader was one of the regulars of this column, and a fine lady. angler, Lylia Bennett.

Yet fishermen collectors like myself still offer a brand new lure for an old one. If you are not a collector, you would be wise to look through your old tackle box and get yourself a set of new lures.

Unless noxious weeds are destroyed by JUNE 8th, 1981, and as often as necessary throughout the season to prevent the ripening of their seeds and dispersal of their pollens. The Town of Halton Hills may enter private property and destroy these weeds. The costs will be charged against the

property owner and collected in the manner of Municipal Taxes. Goatesbeard, Thistles, Chicory, Poison Ivy, Ragweed, Wild Carrot, and Milkweed are among the weeds considered noxious, and must be destroyed wherever found. Complaints regarding Dandelion and Goldenrod will not be accepted as these are not considered noxious under the terms of the Weed Control Act. Anonymous complaints will not be accepted.


