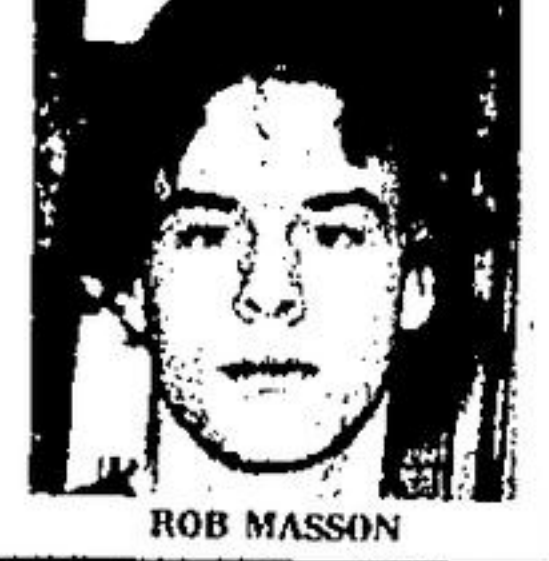
competing in their next big swim meet June 19, 20 and 21 against individuals from three different countries.
