CVCA opens Silver Creek

The Credit Valley Conservation Authority will officially open its much-touted Silver Creek Valley Conservation Education Centre June 22 at 2 p.m. MPP Douglas Kennedy, parliamentary assistant to the minister of education, will be guest of honor for the ceremony, which marks the start of a long-range development project that ultimately will give the Authority its largest conservation area. The centre currently includes a barn and a refurbished house with corresponding nature trails. Authority education officer George Roberts has already conducted a dozen of guided tours and informative sessions for local youngsters visiting the centre. It is located on the Ninth Line just north of Sideroad 27 between Acton and Georgetown.

Trespass warning doesn't worry club

The Georgetown Jaycees expect no problems with their crazy boat race next year even though a recent press release from the Credit Valley Conservation Authority warns river users against trespassing on private property.

The release warns canoeists, boaters and fishermen that "the Trespass to Property Act, 1980, clearly states that every person who enters on premises without the permission of the occupier is guilty of an offence and liable to a fine of not more than \$1,000."

Jaycees president Jack Lee said historically the club, which has run the race annually on the Credit River for 15 years, speaks to property owners where they suspect either their own people or spectators may be trespassing.

After the race, Jaycees go back and clean up any litter or restore any damage that may have occurred during the event. It is known to be a one-day event and people are tolerant because of that, he said.

Since they were warned this year that the Trespass Act could affect them, the club will be taking greater precautions next year.

Mr. Lee said he plans to circulate a notice to those owning property which backs onto the river about a month before the race. The notice will give the date and time of the event and ask property owners to contact the club if they have any concerns regarding the race.

He hopes this action will avoid trouble by giving property owners concerned with trespassing an opportunity to warn the club to keep people away from that section of the river bank.

Mr. Lee was uncertain whether property owners could only keep trespassers off their shoreline or whether the ownership extended into the river so that individuals could refuse access to certain stretches of water.

CVCA public relations officer Joan Rollings said the

river is open to use but not the banks. Therefore she expects no problems for the club in continuing their race.

"We don't see it as a major



problem," Mrs. Rollings said. "We just wanted to warn people and remind them to be polite and ask before they go on private property. They are perfectly welcome on conservation land but where the river banks are privately owned, be courteous."

Mrs. Rollings said the authority is uncertain whether non-

authorily stretches of the bank are privately-owned and therefore they issued the warning to be on the safe side.

So far as the authority can ascertain, if a river is navigable by commercial vessels then its banks can't be fenced or be considered private property. If it is not a navigable river it is subject to the Trespass Act. Down at its mouth where it is navigable, the banks are publicly owned, Mrs. Rollings said. Since there is no list of navigable rivers in Canada they didn't want to find out via a lawsuit that the rest of the banks are privately owned.

Steve Fram, of the Ontario attorney-general's office said the question of whether a waterway is private property or public property under the common laws of England hinges on whether it is a navigable river. He agreed

that without an official list detailing which rivers are which only a court decision will sort things out.

Further complicating the matter is the fact that while a river may be navigable in one place it probably isn't in another. For example, he said,

the Thames River is perfectly navigable at its mouth by London, England, but at its headwaters where it is almost like a well it wouldn't be.

"The only way to test the legislation is through the courts," he said.
