"The last survey was carried out in 1975, and up-todate information is required to manage effectively for the demands that will be placed on Ontario's fisheries in the next decade," Mr. Auld said. Not all of the Ontario residents receiving the ques-

tionnaire will be anglers. The participation in the survey by non-fishing residents is necessary to get a crosssection sampling for unbias-ed results. Non-fishermen will be required to answer only a small section of the questionnaire.

"I would ask that those receiving questionnaires respond as fully as is asked of them, and that they return them as soon as possible." Mr. Auld said.

Results of the survey should be available to the public by mid-year.


