One of the fastest growing and popular sports in Canada and around the world, soccer is slowly beginning to make gains in our own country as qualified coaches become more numerous. Soccer in Canada can no longer be considered a sport popular with only native-born Europeans.

Halton Hills for some time now has had strong soccer clubs and with the acquisition of new playing areas and practice times, expansion of the sport will soon be possible. The interest in soccer has always been strong in town.

Some background on the people involved with our soccer tips: Bill Thomson, the author, is the director of coaching for the Canadian Soccer Association. A former physical education teacher, Bill graduated from the Scottish school of Physical Education and obtained the full coaching awards of both the Scottish and English Football (soccer) associations prior to coming to teach at Upper Canada College in Toronto in 1967.

He has since obtained a B. Ed. from the University of Toronto and a MA in Physical Education from the University of Western Ontario. As a team manager of the Canadian National Team in 1975 Pan Am Games and the 1976 Olympic Team, and with his extensive background as coach and teacher, Bill brings solid coaching ideas and expertise to this instructional series.

Soccer Skills

BRINGING THE BALL UNDER CONTROL using the instep



1. Judge where the ball will drop.

2. Raise instep under the flight of the ball.



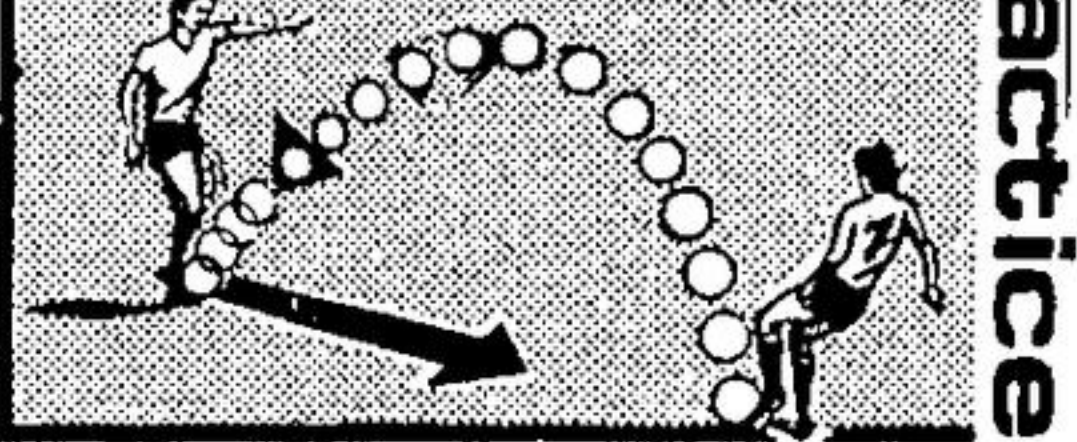
3. Relax the instep on contact.

4. Let the weight of the ball force the instep down.



5. Move off with ball under control.

Inter County rules altered

The Inter County Soccer League reformed itself this year. Over the past few years the league has provided an outlet for recreational players - those too old to play in the youth movement; those whose "legs" are no longer there to be entirely competitive.

This year the rules were altered to allow clubs to sign players, whether or not they played for other clubs. The result has been an influx of players from other leagues eg. Toronto District and National. The standard of play has increased, the degree of competitiveness has increased.

The onus and responsibility of signing players who play for more than one club is shared by clubs and players. It is for each to decide where loyalty lies when there is a clash of commitments. Also, both teams suffer upon an injury sidelining a player.

I am not certain that the original concept of the league remains. The rule change has allowed teams to develop which really belong in a more competitive and higher standard league.
