Technology at Humber College Friday evening.

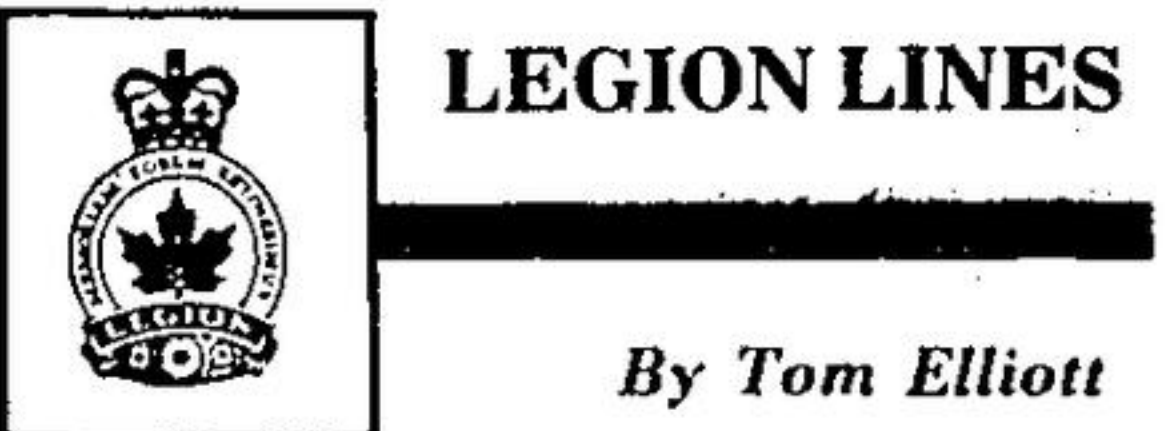
Also congratulations to Donna Ridley, daughter of Rev. and Mrs. R. Walter Ridley, who graduated with Honors B.A., majoring in Pol-
