Portages haven't changed in 100 years

Acton's 'voyageurs' return

The 10-day canoe trip following voyageur routes from North Bay to Mattawa ended successfully Saturday morning for 16 Acton High School students and their three leaders.

Paul Tamblin, total immersion class instructor for the school and leader of the expedition, said everything "went super" for the group and the weather even cooperated better than it did for last year's trip. Although they got a fair bit of rain it was always at night after they had retired to their tents so everyone stayed much drier this time.

As well as students and instructors the group took a photographer along to make a 16 mm movie of their adventures. Mr. Tamblin said they hope to sell it and the Champlain Provincial Park in Mattawa seems interested although they

have no money available at present.

Only 45 of the 185 miles involved in this year's trip were a repeat of territory covered in 1980, he said. The paddling began June 1 at Hurley's Bay, near the mouth of the French River and ended at Mattawa on Friday.

Probably the worst part of the trip was along the Lavase River, which Mr. Tamblin describes as "the worst muddy creek" he has ever seen. It is only seven to nine miles long but there wasn't enough water and it was full of beaver dams over which their two big canoes must be portaged.

At one point where railway crews had blown up a beaver dam and lowered the water about four feet, they got their canoes over a trestle which was about 20 feet in the air and discovered nothing but a sea of mud as far as they

could see. There was no water to float the canoes and no dry place to carry them. As a result his students were up to their waists in mud wading through it, he said.

The area was in property owned by Dupont Chemical and the students had been offered a truck ride around it all because they knew the area was bad. They refused the offer however, and after it was over they were really proud of their accomplishment, Mr. Tamblin said.

The students read before they left Acton that the Talon portage on the Mattawa River was the worst one between Montreal and Thunder Bay according to Alexander McKenzie's writings in the 1800s. After they finished it they agreed with Mr. McKenzie that things haven't changed with that portage even if it is 100 years later.

They also had problems with wind on Lake Nipissing, he said. Three days in a row they were blown off it. While it was fine when they set out in the morning by noon or shortly after it got so windy the waves made it too rough to stay on the water.

Mr. Tamblin said he won't be taking the total immersion program at the school next year. He intends to sit back and evaluate it and see what changes if any are necessary in the program he presents. Since it has been virtually his class alone since it began there will be no immersion class next year.

Last week's storm slammed Acton area

A severe windstorm that uprooted trees and shrubbery approximately three miles south of Acton left residents in the dark without power or telephone service Wednesday afternoon.

Residents on RR4 Acton reported that it became pitch black at approximately 2 p.m. Wednesday. Winds whipped the trees and shrubbery in the area, uprooting several large trees and knocking branches off others. Little damage occurred to the homes themselves with only a few shingles being ripped off the roofs. The entire storm lasted five minutes.

Hydro and telephone lines were out for a few hours but were hooked up again later

that day. Power was switched on at 4 that afternoon with the telephone service hooked up later that evening at approximately 8:30.

Police and firefighters report no occurrences in the area. The district weather office said that there had been a severe weather watch

issued for the area but couldn't say what the velocity of the winds were.
