## Police Beat Sheridan blaze lasts five hours

The Halton regional police Youth Bureau is investigating the role of two juveniles in a blaze at Sheridan Nurseries in Glen Williams that kept Halton Hills firefighters busy for five hours Sunday evening.

The fire started at approximately 4 p.m. Sunday afternoon in an old dump site some 30 feet deep used by the nursery to dispose of old brush and refuse. The firefighters called in the town works department for assistance in battling the blaze when it appeared at one point that it would spread to the surrounding area. A works crew dug a trench separating the burning refuse from the rest of the material easing the task of bringing the fire under control.

No injuries or damage have been reported as a result of the fire.

### Downtown B&Es

A 14-year old Georgetown youth was charged with three counts of breaking and entering by Halton police Sunday morning after three downtown businesses were broken into earlier that morning. The Hi-Neighbour Mini Mart on Main Street, The Arcade on Mill Street and the dental office of Dr. Wolburgh on Guelph Street had all been broken into within a few hours early Sunday morning. Nothing was stolen either from the Arcade or the dental office, while the Mini-Mart reported the theft of a small amount of money.

### Fridge raided

Approximately \$100 worth of food was taken from the Gillard residence at RR1 Georgetown June 15. There were no signs of forced entry but the hungry thieves broke into the residence sometime during the day while the Gillards were not home.

### Gone fishin'?

Over \$300 in fishing equipment was taken from a trailer sometime between Sunday and Tuesday morning. Thieves entered the trailer owned by Graham Tyler, located on RR1 Acton, by breaking a window.

### Quick recovery

Halton police recovered a stolen 1973 Honda motorcycle before its owner even knew of the disappearance Saturday morning. The police discovered the abandoned motorcycle belonging to Lawrie Dickenson of Acton on the Fourth Line and Givens Road in Halton Hills Saturday morning. They believe the bike had been stolen sometime Friday night.

### Theft foiled

Three men attempting to steal a boat, motor and trailer were foiled by the alertness of Doug Trafton early last Wednesday morning. Mr. Trafton woke up at approximately 1 a.m. and saw the three men attempting to drive away with his boat and trailer. He scared them off and in their haste they left behind a stolen car in the driveway. They made their getaway in a second car.

### Vandals hit Arcade

The Arcade on Mill Street in Georgetown was broken into by vandals last Tuesday night. Halton police said it appears they gained entry through the front door, since there was no sign of forced entry. Several machines were damaged, although no actual estimate was recorded.

### VW stolen

A 1975 Volkswagen Rabbit was stolen last Sunday from in front of a Joycelyn Crescent home in Georgetown. The car, estimated to be worth \$3,000, was parked in front of the house late Sunday night and was reported stolen at midnight.

### Escapes custody

A 17-year old Milton youth escaped custody last Tuesday afternoon in Milton Provincial Court after attending a bail hearing. Joseph Finn bolted in the corridor, escaping from the special civilian escort officers after having attended a bail hearing. He had been charged with theft. Staff sergeant Ron Southgate said that this wasn't the first time that Mr. Finn had escaped custody.

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people are concerned with, he said, like road repair, never seem to have enough funding.

Mayor Pomeroy acknowledged that Acton repeatedly supported the town's commitment to build the library-cultural centre, which is expected to open later this autumn. But, he added, that project's costs were known.

"What we did have," he said, "was a total project cost which we don't have (for the Acton town hall). Where... did you ever buy anything without knowing what the price is?"

If the project studies are not completed on time and if the province refuses to grant an extension of its Aug. 1 funds application deadline, Coun. Terry Grubbe urged that council should meet at the end of July to vote on whether or not to drop its bid to restore the town hall.

The building has been proposed as a new drop-in for local

senior citizens, a meeting hall for a number of service organizations and, with its large upstairs area, with a common hall for wedding receptions and dinners, the rent from which could pay for the building's upkeep.
