Oakville, the 1980 Ontario champions and only one loss this year, opened strongly against the Junior Falcons. John Hofdahl made a couple of fine saves, Ashley Sanders cleared a corner, a timely tackle by Rick Foot, some near misses and twice the goalstandards came into play to deny Oakville.

Sporadic raids by the Falcons only troubled Oakville once, when Gary Lockwood came close. Riv Kennedy and Steve Swinscoe were hard worked defending the mid field. In 30 minutes Oakville's No. 9 and captain opened the scoring and No. 11 added a second before the half. The 1980 champions went on to a 0-5 result, yet our guys were not disgraced and gave Oakville a good run.

The Andrew Murray Chev Olds Major Atoms were also hemmed in for the opening of their game against Newmarket. Goalie Philip Renberg distinguished himself in the early going with Mathew Remedios and Curtis Green prominent in clearing their lines. Newmarket soon took the lead and held on to win an exciting contest.

Meanwhile up at Barrie the Meteor Major Peewees socked two home team 4-0 whilst playing good soccer, improving upon their last couple of matches. Goalie Peter Jones hardly was in trouble throughout, defenders John Hatze, Doug Covert and Jay Anderson doing a good stopping job. 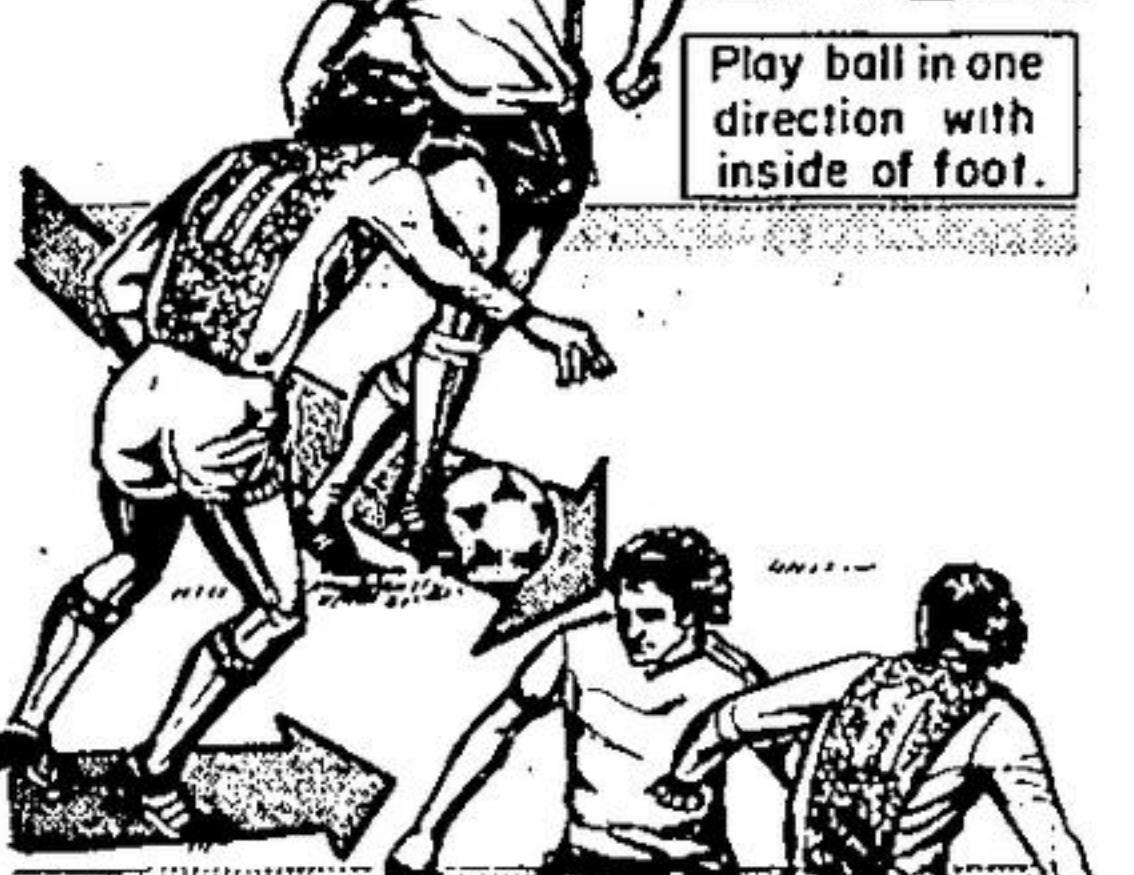
