#### READ UP ON CAMPING

With the camping season upon us, now is a good time to read up on camping. Actually, it is only the best time if you did not get it during the "hard water" season, winter. A small pocket size booklet written by Shirley Teasdale is available at many sporting goods stores and book shops, the cost is only one dollar, and covers all you need on camping. Experience will tell you the rest, if there is any.

BASS season is now open all over Ontario, and this is the time I have been waiting for. All fishing is important to me, but the Bass is still my favorite fish. Shared some good time with a few fishers on Fairy Lake in Acton last weekend as I could not get away north. Took enough filets home to feed the family, and had a good day to boot. One thing must stop.

The use of power boats on that miniature lake must be banned. They are simply not needed to get around the small waterway, and the damage they do intensifies the need for a ban. The lake is very weedy and the motor props chew up the week and strew it all over the waters surface.

This floating weed then messes up the beaches and every time a cast is made, even with a so-called weedless lure, it comes back loaded. Small electric motors may be alright as the power is low and the speed slow. If hitting weed the motor would probably stop.

#### WORK ON PATTERN

As for fishing Fairy Lake, you simply must work out a pattern, and then concentrate on it. Last Saturday the pattern was the weeding, or more simply the deep edge of a weedbed. Casting with a Sassy Shad on a spinner, bait, or a yellow "creature" which is a soft vinyl salamander on a Johnson Silver Minnow. Fish the contact point, the place where the fish first contact weed after coming from deepwater. Also fan cast the weed "bays" or pockets while anchored out. The pattern may be different next time out, so work it out and work it.

This applies to all bass waters, regardless if they are the weedfilled lakes of the south central region of Ontario, or the rocky points of lakes and rivers such as the French, the Key and the Moon rivers for Smallmouth blackbass.

You will find that the fish in any one area of a lake or an entire small lake will be on the same pattern. Figure that out and you will have good fishing.

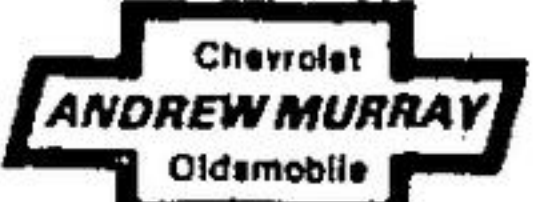

### Colgate winner

Jennifer Gallagher of Park junior public school won the 100 yard dash (10-11 years category) last Saturday at the prestigious Colgate Women's games in which she beat out 130 runners for her gold medal.

Jennifer and teammate Tammy Green are two grade six students who accompanied teacher-coach Jim Cavasin to Etobicoke's Centennial stadium and were part of a meet which attracts women athletes from all over Ontario, Quebec and parts of the United States.

Jennifer finished her 100 yard run with a time of 14.30 seconds while her nearest competitor finished with a time of 14.38. About 1,800 girls and young women entered the fourth annual Colgate Women's games - an increase of 100 per cent over 1979.

More than \$13,000 in educational grants were awarded to the winners of 12 different track and field events. Jennifer was presented with a cheque for \$50 which she must use for educational purposes.

The goals of Colgate-Palmolive Canada to sponsor the Games were to develop and expand the level of female participation in track and field, to provide resources through Grants-In-Aid so that athletes could pursue an education.
