Hospice care sessions evaluated

'Sharing and caring' earns group accolades

The North Halton hospice care interest group held its final meeting of the season June 17, at St. John's United Church in Georgetown.

The idea behind Hospice care of providing for an optimum environment for the terminally ill can only be achieved if there is time to listen, to understand and to provide care. A great deal of study on this subject indicates that this time is not available in normal health care facilities.

A group workshop session accomplished the results organizers desired. Attendance at the group's four meetings and evaluation forms that have been returned suggest there is a desire for such a focus of care and many desire a more personal investigation of their own feelings and experiences with death, along with help in acquiring skills and confidence necessary to support dying.

It is felt that even though there is no immediate opportunity to establish a working Hospice, it is still possible to provide personal help and caring to those who are dying and their families. Regardless of whether this help is forth coming from professionals or lay friends it is more effective if it is based on relevant knowledge and skills. The group aims to provide these.

Two people who attended this meeting for the first time were asked to write down their feelings about the meeting and what it accomplished. Written by Vera House of Milton

"Having for some time been very interested in Hospice Care, it was my privilege to attend a meeting of the Halton Palliative Care Group at St. John's Church".

It was a most interesting informative meeting with pertinent information presented. A very friendly atmosphere prevailed and tea and coffee had been prepared by the organizers for everyone. The atmosphere was informal and discussions were lively as everyone participated.

Several "exercises" had been planned - the group enjoyed them and gained more insight and knowledge from participation and discussions.

All had a common interest in Hospice care and shared interest in helping terminal patients and their families to live as fully as possible physically, emotional and spiritually for us as long as there is life - the Hospice care volunteer would be trained to help.

I felt that all were concerned, interested in the Hospice Care Program and left the meeting feeling more enthusiastic (i.e. convinced that this is a much needed and worthwhile service)."

"This was the first meeting of this nature that I had attended - I was impressed. I found the group to be very friendly and certainly very sharing and caring. It truly provided food for thought."
