Glen Merchants still strong after 1980's 'best season'

For a team that has not attracted many ballplayers from outside of the Glen Williams area, the Glen Merchants have remained surprisingly competitive in their Intercounty fastball league.

The Glen team is mostly comprised of players who have been with the club since its inception in 1978. Only one of the present members did not play basebali in the Glen minor ball system, which has to say something for the calibre of ball being played in the Glen.

The team started with a young squad of boys just out of juvenile. Until Glen Williams played Intercounty, they had an entry in the Halton Softball Association, playing such teams as Lowville and Hornby.

However, some teams of the Halton Softball Association wanted to join another league so John Haines and Bill Zilio asked for an entry

into the Intercounty league. The Glen Merchants play against such teams from Belwood, Erin, Guelph, Fergus, Hillsburg, Orangeville, Alton and Cambridge.

Under the sponsorship of the Way-Jay club in Norval, the Glen Williams team ended up in sixth place after the first year. In the playoffs, the Glen men were eliminated in the first round of play by Cambridge who later won the entire championship.

One of the most memor-

able games for the team was two years ago in the first round of playoffs against the Hespler BeeHives. In a game that was the third and deciding game of the best two of three series, Jeff Haines pitched for 29 innings in a losing effort. The BeeHives and the Glen were tied 0-0 for 28 straight innings until the BecHives broke loose for three runs in the top of the 29th inning. The game

started at 8 p.m. but did not

finish until 1:30 p.m. Last season new sweaters were required and the Glen businessmen and area businesses were asked to help sponsor individual sweaters. About 17 merchants came forward to lend their support and thus the name Glen Merchants name was initiat-


