Halton forest a 'gift'?

Regional council will ask the province's natural resources ministry to write off a \$200,000 debt before the Halton Regionai Conservation Authority takes over control of a 990acre forest located next to the Hilton Falls Conservation Area in Milton.

The forest, covering about 1,200 acres of the Hilton Falls Environmentally Sensitive Area, has been managed by the ministry under a special agreement in which the property management costs were partially covered from the sale of forest products.

But members of the region's finance and administration committee last Wednesday decided that because the revenues don't completely pay for the management costs, the ministry should be happy to give the property back to the Authority, dropping the deficit. Costs to the authority would be relatively minimal, although it would mean probably an additional \$8,500 spent on maintenance and security on the property.

A popular recreational area for snow-mobilers, all terrain vehicles and naturalists, the forest is in an environmentally sensitive area. Transferring its management to the Authority, a regional planning department report states, would mean a "substantial improvement in security and control".

Regional council is expected to discuss the proposal at its meeting this afternoon.

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
