### Fred Howse builds rods

The fisherman's fisherman. That is quite a title, but well earned when talking of Fred Howse of Norval. Fred is one of the best fishermen around and has a great many large fish to prove it, and his interest in fishing never wanes.

A tool and die maker by trade, Mr. Howse runs Freds Live Bait in Norval where a fisherman can get bait and information, tackle and talk. One section of the Howse walk-in basement is set aside as a fishing tackle store lined with rods, reels and all the line and lures you may need. Fred, at one time lived in Penetanguishene where his father is presently constructing a new marina, expected to be the largest in the Penetang area, and his knowledge of Georgian Bay fishing is excellent.

#### BUILDING RODS

Tool and die making skills are put to another use, the building of custom rods, and Fred will make them to order and the orders are sometimes very different from the norm. A common type of rod is the use of a fly rod blank built into a spinning rod style for the specialized fishing for Rainbow trout.

Need minnows for bait? Fred packs his live minnows in large plastic bags and then fills the bag with oxygen from the large pressurized bottle in the corner of his store. These minnows will live a week or more in this pack if kept cool, and the worms Fred sells, if kept cool, will also last the length of a fishing trip.

Rod and reel repairs are sometimes necessary and Fred Howse takes care of these and the service is fast.

#### RECORD PIKE CAUGHT

A new record pike has been caught in France. The pike is native to the higher latitudes of North America, in circumpolar western Europe and eastern Siberia. Louis Kitegal, a French angler from the city of Schorbach, took the new record 41 pound, 14 ounce (19 kilos) pike on a number 4 Super Vibrax spinner. This spinner was introduced to North America last year by the Blue Fox Tackle company of Cambridge Minnesota, and are available in Canada. The huge pike had a girth of 26 inches (66 cm) and was 4 ft. 5 in. (1.35 meter) in length.

- (c) overhead. This knot can weaken some lines by 50%. One of the strongest, most reliable fishing knots is the TRILENE knot.
- (d) all of above. All nylons absorb water and undergo change. Wet general purpose nylon lines can drop 20% in break strength.
- (b) slightly low. Unless labelled tournament grade, most premium monofilament lines will break at slightly higher than labelled values.
- (a) heat & sunlight. All nylon lines will weaken in a matter of days when subjected to this continued exposure. First clue to damage is a loss of color.
- (d) all of above. Many companies are making completely different types of nylon lines by different methods. The best nylon alloy lines are super strong due to new chemistry and new processing.
- (c) smaller diameter. Fish lines of same lb. test but different diameters. The smaller diameter line gives better lure action. If diameters are equal, the thinner alloy lines work best.
- (c) inspect line guides. Check for cracked, worn-out line guides using a cotton Q-tip. Replace, don't try to polish out.
- (a) use thinner line. Smaller diameter lines peel off easier, cast farther, and more accurately. Keep reel spools filled 1/8" below spool lip.
- (b) slightly increase. As line is stripped, spool diameter decreases causing an increase drag resistance. Back-off drag on strong fish.
- (d) non-existent. A fisherman's dream yet to be realized. Most visible are bright, gaudy fluorescent colors.
