Royalette hurler a ten-year vet

Captain Barb Curry anxious for finals

Even for a 10 year veteran of the Legion Royalties, the pressure surrounding the Ontario finals makes her worry sometimes.

Barb Curry has been with the Royalties one year longer than coach Ted Wilkes and has experienced the team's successes and failures over the course of a decade.

The Intermediate girls fastball captain says her team is anxiously looking forward to the finals to be held in Georgetown August 14, 15, 16. However, Barb feels that with so many injuries to the club recently, it has given the team few chances to develop a set line and unit.

Barb says that with a healthy lineup and regulars playing their position game after game, it is easier for their teammates to know what they will do under a certain situation.

"Whether we win or lose, the Ontario finals will be a great event to be a part of. Because the finals will be in Georgetown, it should be really good for ladies baseball," Barb says.

There have been some unexpected happenings over the season for the Royalties thus far. Barb says that some of their game losses can be attributed to the number of injuries on the team.

But she's also enthusiastic about some of the new recruits this year and those players from last year who have matured. Dea Rutherford has made a difference since she decided to re-join the team a month ago and Becky Halonen at second base has "improved a lot" and is a strong member of the infield, Barb says.

For the Royalties captain, the entire 1978 year was a highlight for her because the team played their best

baseball ever in the Ontario finals and thoroughly trounced Amsbury 22-4. The team went on to become the Juvenile 'A' Ontario champions.

The next season the team advanced to junior competition but didn't do well at all.

It seems the Royalties are more competitive in their second year playing in a new division. Since Barb has joined the team, she has followed the Royalties as they went from Midgets, Juveniles and Juniors to Intermediates.

As a Junior Barb remembers one particular game in Belleville against Port Perry in the Regional finals. She and her teammates were surprised at how well she did pitching and striking out a number of batters. A more recent highlight was last year in Kleinburg at the Ontario regionals where she pitched well and the team won 7-2.

Barb likes playing centre field as well as pitching, especially when you make the big catch, but she says with pitching, "you're in every part of the game." As a pitcher you're either the hero or the goat, she says.

In a real pressure situation, you just have to bear down and work on your concentration, Barb says. "You have to know the situation you're in."

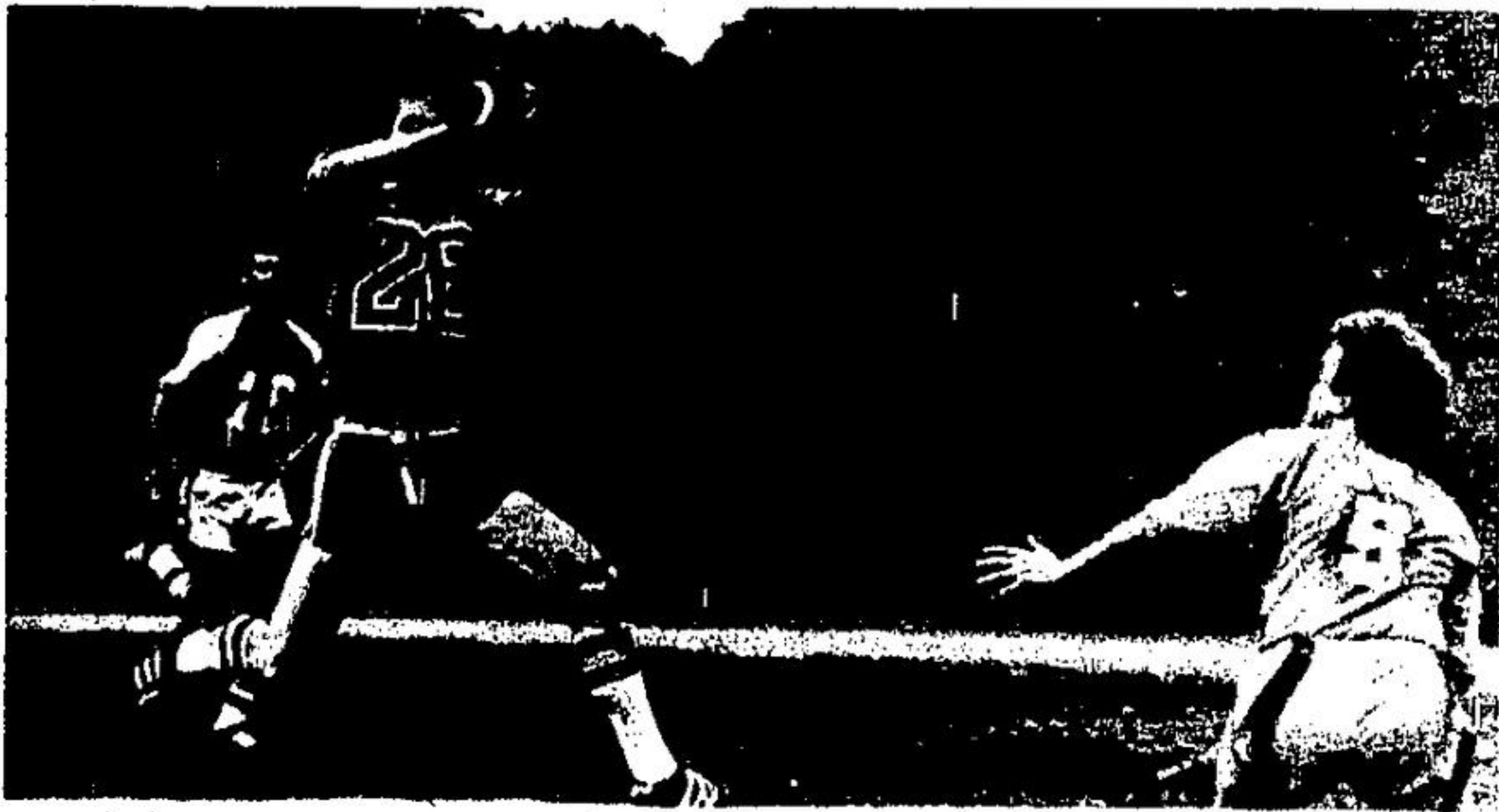
