Vandalism is a problem that affects all the people that use the Town pool facilities. This problem has grown in size and has resulted in high repairs bills and staff costs, as well as causing problems for individuals that use the pools.

It is too bad that there are a few individuals that are causing the problems and we all have to suffer the

We hired an individual to patrol the men's changeroom during the recreational swim sessions and this has proven to be extremely helpful in eliminating the vandalism and hooliganism.

We have set up disciplinary procedures that will be enforced on individuals that cause the problems and they are as follows:

1st infraction — suspended one day. 2nd infraction suspended two weeks with the Pool Supervisor calling the individuals parents or guardian explaining the problem and reasons for the suspension. 3rd infraction - suspended for two months and a letter going to the parents or guardian explaining problems and reasons for suspension, from the Supervisor of Aquatics.

An immediate suspension of one year from all Halton Hills pool facilities will be given to all individuals who are caught stealing or willfully damaging the pool facility.

Along with this suspension, a letter will be sent to the individuals parents and police, explaining the reason for the suspension and that if the person is found on the premises within the one year period they will be charged with trespassing.

The V.I.P. (Volunteer Instructor Person) program is going very well. We have a number of volunteers at each pool (Georgetown Indoor Pool, Dick Licata Memorial Pool, Acton Indoor Pool) every morning, helping out with lessons.

Prerequisites are 13 years of age or older and Senior level or higher. The devoted leader receives a three month pass, gets good training in teaching and handling children and is included in many aquatic staff events; training, barbecues, etc.
