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Hockey landmark evolves further

One of Georgetown's hockey landmarks has further evolved from the milk-toting horse and buggy days of Maple Leaf's dairy.

On Mill Street near the corner of Mill and Guelph, Gerry and Dave Kentner opened their Dairy Bar eight years ago in a building formerly thought of as a local hockey hotbed. The restaurant continues to thrive on the exhilaration and inhalation of Canada's number one sport.

But conditions have changed again at the Dairy Bar as a recent addition to the building has left the restaurant with a 30 per cent reduction in seating. Last week a new office was built into the side of the restaurant to facilitate the growing catering business of Kentners.

The 10 days of renovations left the Dairy Bar with a fresh facelift which will feature a nicer atmosphere for the customers Dave Kentner says. "We hope that our volume will be even greater with air conditioning and better surroundings," says Kentner.

The Kentners

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The building, thought to be constructed in the 1920's was first used as a dairy where milk was manufactured and processed then sent to customers by horse carts. Dave Kentner remembers the horse barn out in the back of what was then called Maple Leaf Dairy.

Ernie Thompson was owner of the Dairy and he had a Dairy Bar at the front of the building where customers talked and breathed hockey during the winter months.

Because of the close proximity to Memorial Arena where the Legion's Saturday morning hockey started, coaches were forever stopping by to talk about their latest win or their star forward.

Ernie Thompson was also the Georgetown Raider general manager and president. Now that Dave Kentner has also taken over the helm as Raider GM, the former location of dairy continues as a landmark for Raider hockey talk.

Across from the dairy bar at the Massey Ferguson building there was Ken McMillan who was president of the OHA in the late fifties.
