The Ancient Mariners, then composed of all over 35-year-olds who were either youth soccer coaches or referees played exhibition games and they

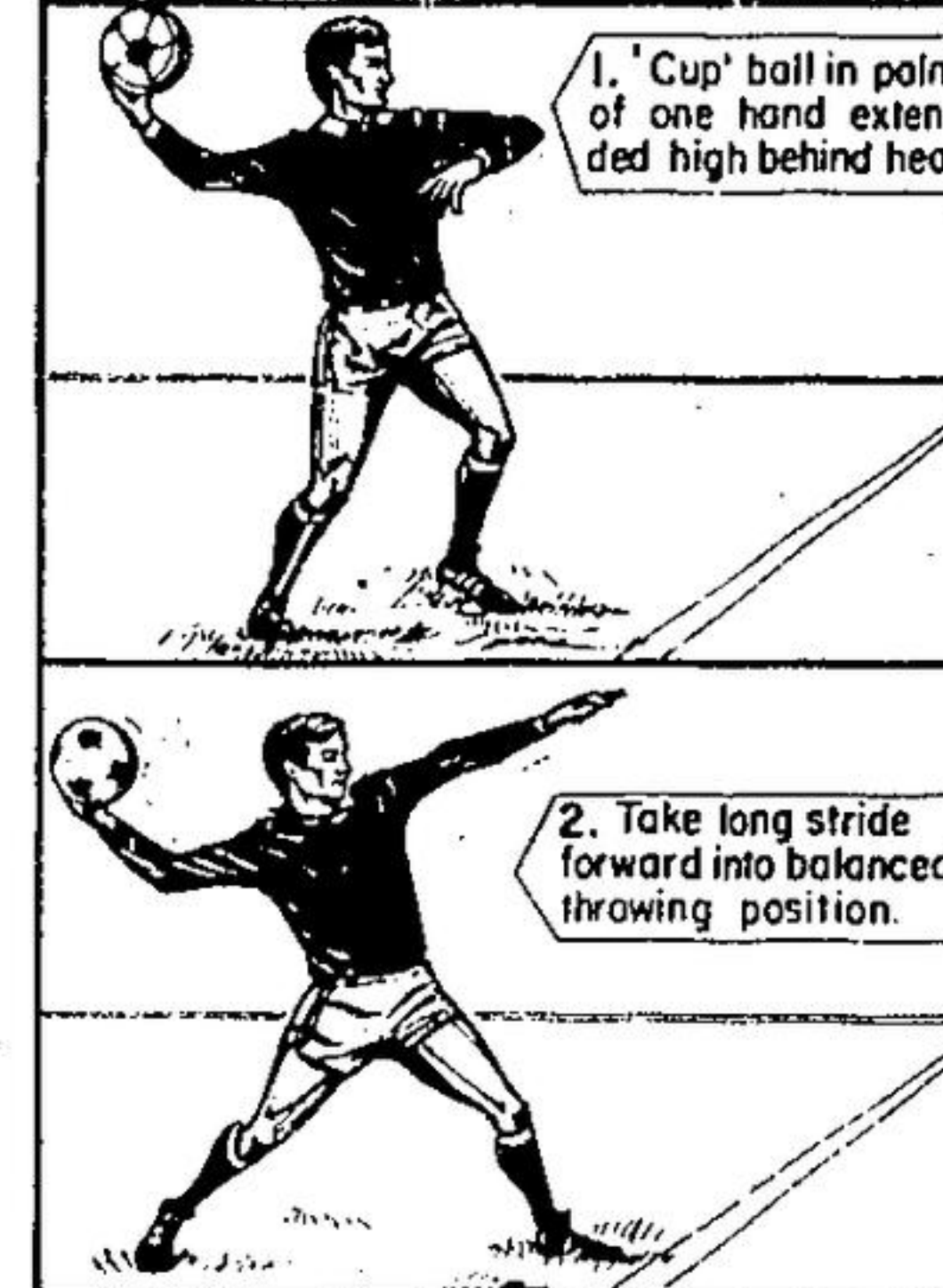
taught those younger players who they faced on the field.

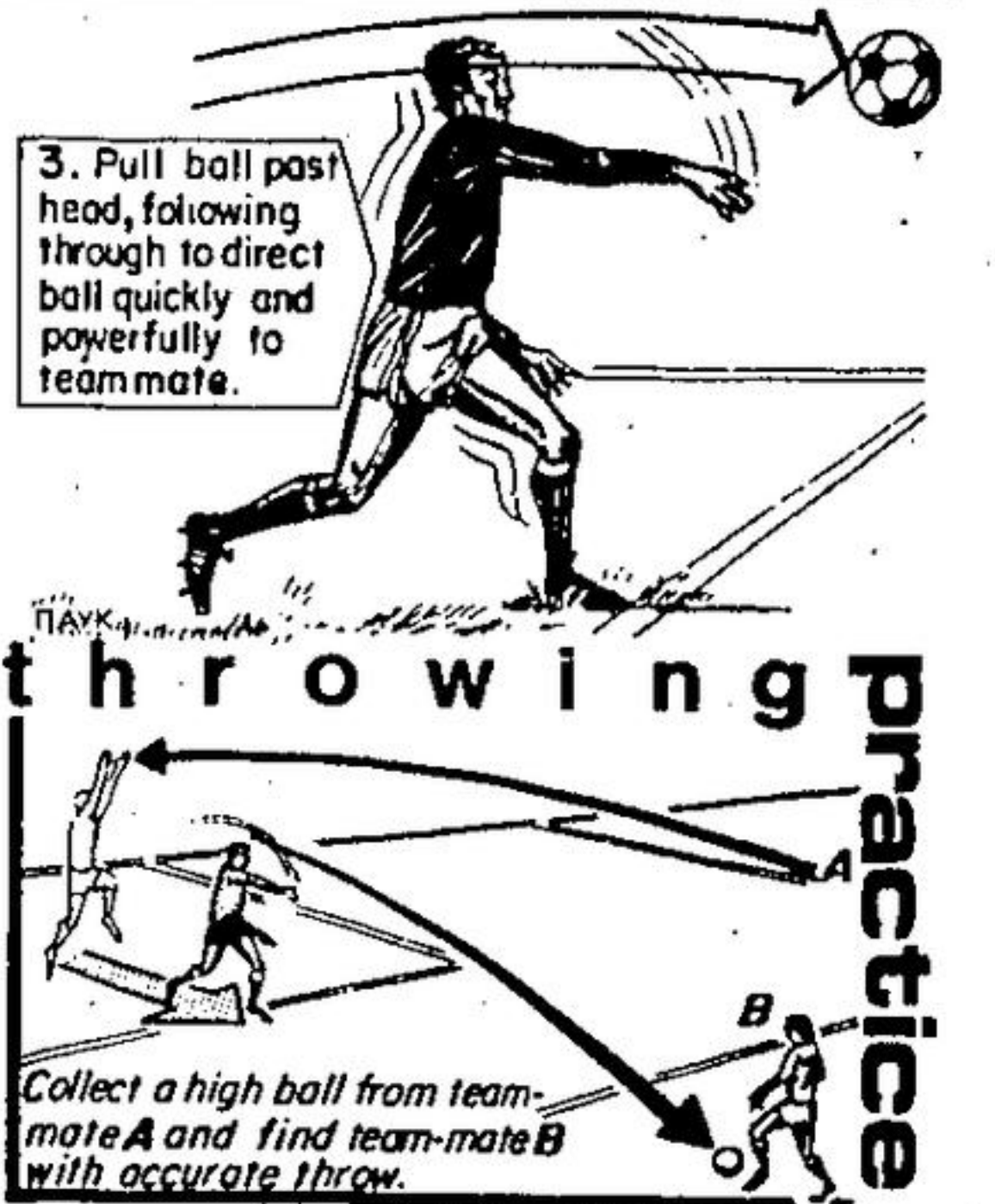
THROWING using: JAVELIN STYLE



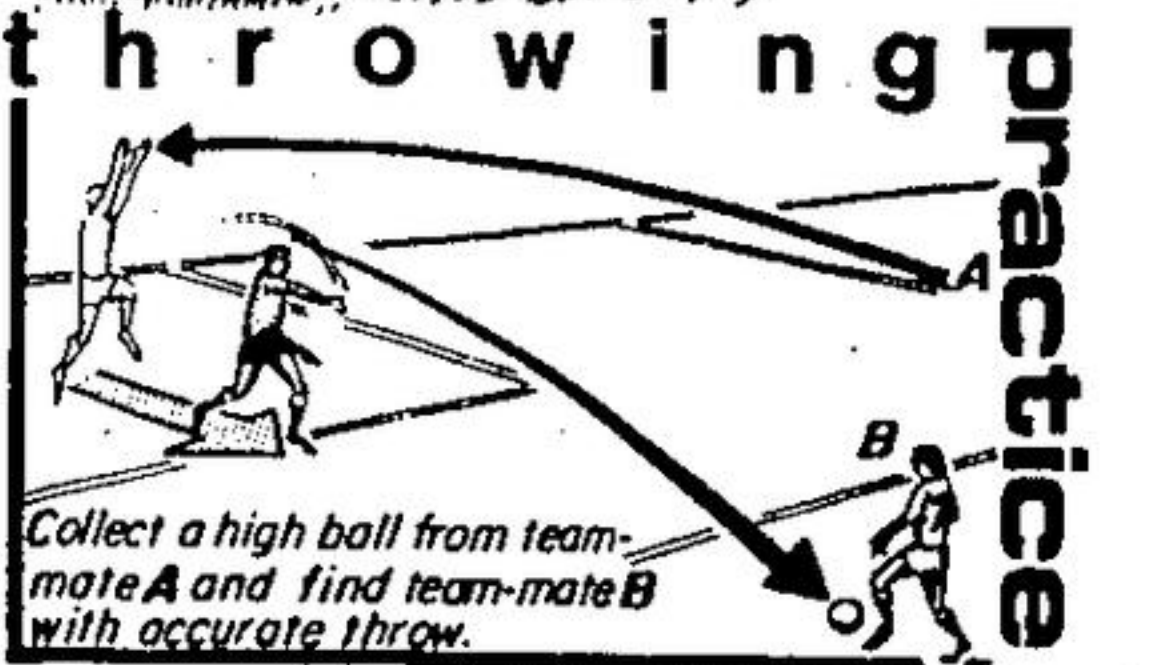
1. 'Cup' ball in palm of one hand extended high behind head

Georgetown 'dismiss' Cambridge

Georgetown put up a magnificent performance in the field to dismiss Cambridge for a paltry 29, the lowest total by any team this year in the Hamilton and District League match. The match was played on their home ground at Stewarthur Public School on August 2.

Georgetown skipper A. Kumar lost the toss and Cambridge decided to bat to the left hand medium fast K. Hammarine and medium pacer N. Balkisson.

After playing 3 maidens, Balkisson drew the first blood by having Wade taken in slips by K. Lakhan for a duck. G. Fern the other opener fell immediately after brilliantly caught by Campbell who dived full length forward to pick the ball inches off the ground. G. Persaud, V. Forde and W. Watson all fell in quick succession two of them bowled and the third brilliantly caught by Hammarine.

Thus Cambridge were all out for 29. Balkisson and Hammarine bowled magnificently returning 6 for 21 and 4 for 7 respectively. Georgetown fielding was tight and top class.
