Ontario Hydro plans microwave system

Ontario Hydro is about to embark on an Environmental Assessment study to determine the effects of building a microwave communications system between the Milton Transformer Station and the Bruce Nuclear Development on the Bruce Peninsula.

Hydro says it's unlikely the towers will cut through Halton Hills, but the study will include parts of the town, particularly the Acton area where microwave repeater stations may be added to the system. Preferred sites for the towers will be announced later.
