Switzer's Inn' hosts prospects

Gemini coach working full-time to find the right combination of imports

Herald Sports Editor To spend a night watching hockey with the Georgetown Geminis doesn't stop after practice when the equipment is hung to dry and the last player has left the dressing

-The local Junior B hockey club seems determined to spend extra hours this summer preparing themselver for the 1981-82 schson. Going back to coach Switzer's house to watch a video replay after Thursday's practice means travell-ing from Meadowvale's double rink in Mississauga to Switzer's Etoblcoke home near the QEW highway.

Eight players came back from practice to watch the video films from 10:30 p.m. to midnight and see how they could improve their game.

The success of the coach's spring land training program and his current on-ice practices are an indication that the club has begun to inspire the players with the same type of enthusiasm that has enveloped the club executive since last April.

The Geminis are looking to rebuild their club from a small nucleus of returning veterans.

Coach Dave Switzer says he's excited about veteran Georgetown homebrews Ed Dwyer and Mike McNenemy plus some other returnees, but he's looking carefully at a long list of import players to give the Geminis the balance and depth to develop a solid hockey club.

Last Thursday at Meadowvale double rink near the 401 highway and Mississauga Road, 30 hockey players scrimmaged for one hour in front of the watchful eyes of coach Switzer, assistant coach Bob McCandless Jr. and club president Bob 'Zeke' McCandless. Most of those present were import prospects of which the coach must pick only seven - the rest of the team must consist of local talent. MTHLSCOUTED

The Geminis will be making good use of their import allowance this year. All of the MTHL coaches (Metro Toronto Hockey League) have been contacted for player leads and a number of boys have been asked to try-out for the team.

The coach also has a variety of contacts elsewhere which have attracted players from the United States. Two impressive prospects are Mike Corbley, a 6'2" defenceman from New York and goalle Steve Sullivan from Park Ridge, Illinois.

hockey players living with him at the moment. Last week he had seven boys in his house. A number of the prospects were from Timmins. He's been taking the boys golfing and fishing on a number of occasions. Switzer's wife has also goodnaturedly put the boys to work around the house.

To interview Switzer is to interview a man brimming with confidence about the prospects for a 100 per cent effort for next season. "I can guarantee entertaining hockey if not a winner," he says. The coach says the executive were ready for a different brand of hockey when they hired him and he's happy with their response and support.

His move to make former Gemini captain, Bob McCandless his assistant coach is, "the best choice I've made yet," he says.

Along with help from his scout Reg Herrod, whom he has known for some years, the former Toronto Red Wings Bantam coach is looking for players who will exhibit an aggressive style. He's not interested in developing any fighters on his team, but he realizes that fighting is part of a game and you, "can't walk away from a sucker shot." NORTH BAY

As well as driving to such places as North Bay to recruit players for his team, Switzer has been trying to arrange for the possibility of the Geminis entering a team
