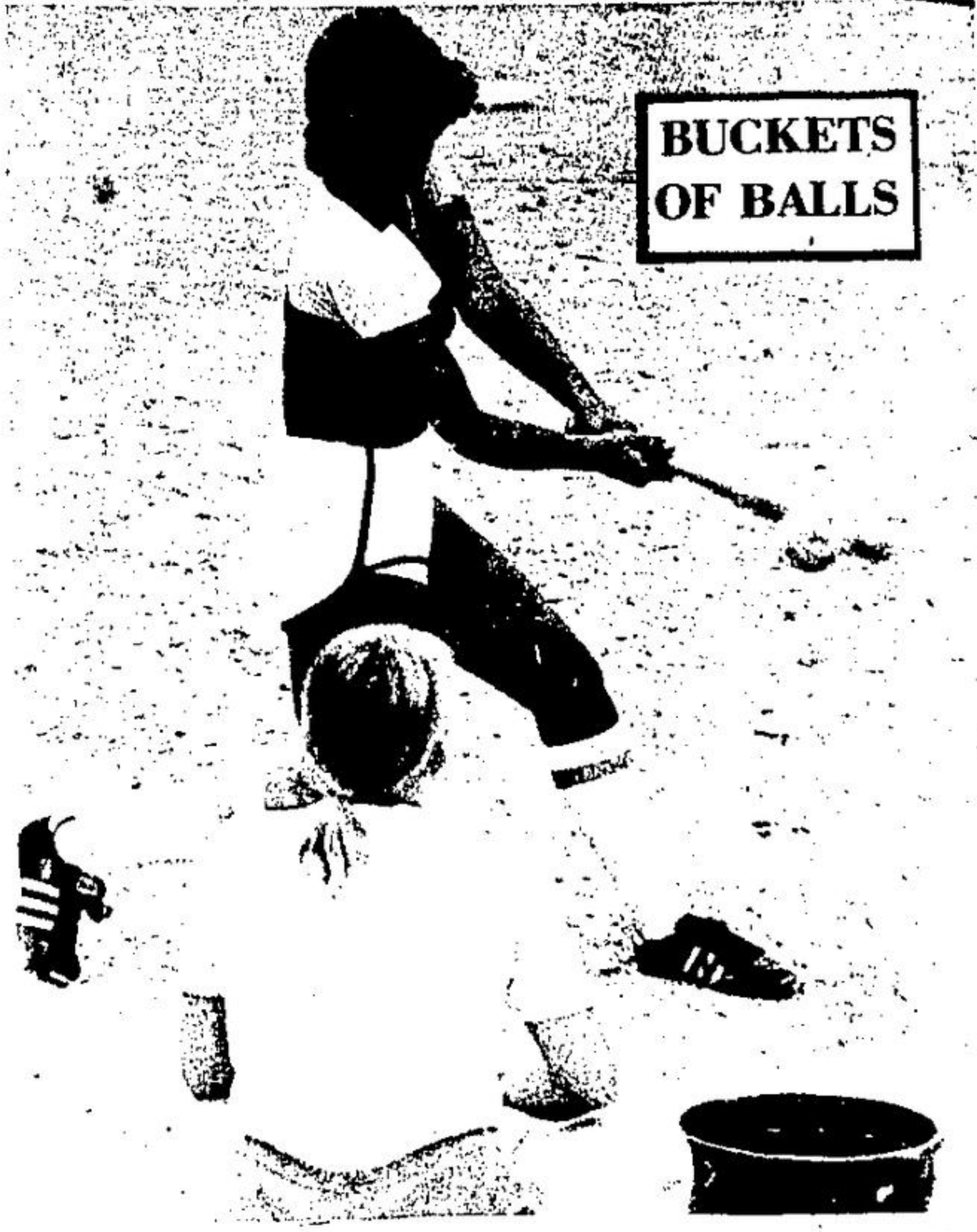


A Royalette flashback The way they were

"Royalettes swamp Georgetown"

 Three wins in three outings

 Statistics released by the Peel County Girls Softball Association, as of June 28 show the Georgetown Royalettes leading the Peel County Juvenile Division by a slim margin over Alderwood. It's turning out to be quite a battle for the top spot in the league and there is little to choose between the league leaders.

The Royalettes' only loss of the season to date has been to Alderwood but they avenged that with a victory over their rivals in their last meeting. Burlington is not far off the frontrunning place, holding down third spot, only three points behind the Royalettes.

The Royalettes are competing in the Juvenile division for the first time. They played Miget last year, and the confidence in the girls' abilities shared by team handlers, Ted Wilkes and Jack Handy, has been amply justified.

But it wasn't an instant success story for Becky. She spent most of last season watching the seasoned veterans go out and field and hit

while she was riding the bench. During her first year the coach complimented her on "having the right stuff," but combining choir practice with the Cantante Singers was hard for her to juggle.

This year when second base was left vacant, Becky Halonen soon proved herself worthy of filling the void. "I love second base," she says.

But the price of remaining a starter was costly. Mid-way through the season she collided with a fellow teammate and suffered facial injuries which kept her away from baseball for almost two weeks.

Soon after her first accident, she suffered from a painful bruised finger which has hampered her play, but Becky has come back to the team each time undaunted.

Becky still thinks of herself as a rookie and is sometimes in awe of the more seasoned veterans on the team. This year she says although there is as much talent as last year's team, the wins have been much harder for the Royalettes.

Big crowds at the Ontario finals at the Fairgrounds should help Becky because she's looking forward to the fan support.
