cornerstone.
Yet their bent-laid plans went astray and the congregation had to be satisfied with a complete overhaul of the existing church. The chancel was widened and enlarged, a new wing containing a parish room was added, the inner porch was removed, with a new outer porch added on the corner, the interior was lined with pine and a new brass lectern was installed. The original wide boards used to build the church were left beneath the present walls and floor.

A final structural touch was made to the church in 1912 with the addition of a parish hall. The congregation felt it was time they had a place where they could hold their gatherings and Sunday School classes.

PRESENT LOOK
St. Alban's began to take on its present appearance in 1934 after a bequest of \$2,000 to the church allowed more renovations to both the church and the rectory. The old outer frame of the church was covered with the stucco that gives the church its unique appearance today.

During the 1940s, stained glass windows were installed, improvements were made on the heating system in both the church and the parish hall and a new pipe organ was installed.

With the arrival of Reverend Luxton in the early 1950s, the church got its most recent addition, the parish hall adjoining it. Plans were drawn up for the new parish hall and construction continued on it until 1953. The present rectory on Jeffrey Avenue was purchased in 1957 after the old one on Willow Street could no longer survive any more repairs. It had been renovated and redesigned in some form or another four separate times in 82 years.

The parish hall was in use by 1953 but wasn't formally dedicated until 1959. It was dedicated to the memory of Reverend Luxton, who died in 1952 before seeing its completion. The congregation wanted to honor him as one who persevered and succeeded in getting a new hall for St. Alban's.

Today, St. Alban's serves 246 families in the Acton area. Reverend Arthur Tribe is the 27th rector for St. Alban's. Mr. Tribe has been serving the Acton parish for two years

and was previously stationed at Jarvis, near Lake Erie. Reverend Tribe was ordained in 1964 and worked for six and a half years as a probation officer in Toronto.

It seems unlikely that St. Alban's will undergo much more change in the near future, save for odd repairs. At the moment, it has become small for the number of families it serves and the day may come when it will have to be replaced by a modern, larger church.

Church enjoys varied schedule

St. Alban's has a varied schedule of services and clubs that the members of the parish can participate in. Reverend Tribe conducts services Sunday mornings at 9 and 10:30 and a Holy Communion service Wednesday mornings at 10. Sunday school classes are held during the second service at 10:30.

Various church groups and organizations keep the members of the congregation busy all month long. The Anglican Church Women meet the first Wednesday every month to plot their fund-raising campaigns for the Anglican community as a whole. Members of the Servers Guild help Reverend Tribe conduct the services each Sunday and the Altar Guild members look after the altar. The parish council meets the fourth Thursday evening every month to discuss matters regarding the functions of the parish.

Non-Anglican groups also make use of the parish hall and include Weight Watchers, the Golden Age Senior Citizens, a nursery on Tuesdays and a foster parent organization.

Little Miss Halton Hills needs volunteer 'babysitters'

The fate of a baby show and contest for little girls at the Georgetown Fair is still undecided, say Fair Board officials.

Rita and Jim Barrett, who originated and produced both a Baby Contest and Little Miss Halton Hills pageant at the 1980 Fair, have moved out west and, since that time, no one has been found to carry on the organization of the events.

In April, the Fair Board said that if the Little Miss pageant was to continue this year, it would take place the Saturday morning of the fair, as usual, but all contestants would be asked to wear "pioneer" costumes in keeping with the fair's 135th anniversary theme. A boy's event was also suggested. Georgetown Agricultural Society president Joyce Gosling says that adverse

public reaction given the two events in the past year appears to have intimidated some people. The number of contestants interested is unknown, says the president, and no one has volunteered to take on the organizational work involved, despite a canvas of individuals both within and outside the Fair Board.

"Of course," says Mrs. Gosling, "this is the same old problem for us: lack of workers to carry out the many events at fair time."

The board would like to carry on with all the new events introduced last year, but at the moment, only the Children's Pet Show and Pony-rama have been scheduled. The baby show, a very popular feature at Georgetown Fair for almost 20 years in the 1930s and '40s, was one of many events

planned for Zeller's Tent. Last year, the event had to be held outdoors despite the cold temperature.

A meeting of the Fair

Board will be held in the next few days, says the president, and the program will hopefully be finalized for Fair Days, Oct. 2 and 3.
