# Extra large Coho salmon

Of course SALMON are the hot news these days, but there is still a lot of good fishing around the province, and I will try toget some of it here for you. Please let me know of any activity you may be experiencing in the field of bass or

The COHO salmon in Lake Ontario seem to be extra large for this time of the season, but that is no indication that the all time record will be broken.

It may be as these fish put on about one pound of weight each week between now and the run upriver to spawn. That could meen an extra eight pounds, add that to the 12 pounds plus fish that were landed last week and WOW. As mentioned don't expect it but it may happen.

The largest Chinook to last Saturday was a 27.12 pounder taken by R. McGarry of Oshawa, and the 17.64 pound COHO taken by Ray Bruneau of Whitby, I am endeavoring to keep a daily tally of the contest, and if you wish information please call me at 877-9290 or 877-2201.

Up to date information on what to use and where to use it as well as any other pertinent facts will be ready. Just talking to Date Wood of Glendale Charters, and he is of the same opinion as others I have talked to. The few fish of good size are the exception, and the majority of fish,

(if you can call it a majority) are small.

Lake Eric is still hot with lots of big fish, but Lake Ontario is still slow. Remember that I forecast months ago, that the salmon could be slow this year, until late in the season. These may be of the same strain as the salmon that came in October during the fall of 1979, and the fishermen had already left the lake.

DALE KNOWS FISH Dale is a knowledgeable fisherman, and is well able to find the fish if they are there. Give him a call, if you want to know what is going on out on the lake, 877-1638.

Probably things will improve rapidly after Labour Day weekend, and from the report given to me by Dale Wood, Lake Erie should be better than ever next year and if the number of small salmon here on Lake Ontario this year is any indication, he believes it will be hot here too.

Even though the Police are searching for a body in the waters of Kelso park in the Milton area, the park is still in full swing. There are activities for almost everybody, and the fishing is still good there for trout,

The Halton Region Conservation Authority photo contest is still open to entrants and the Corn Cob Capers will be a great family activity at Mountaberg.

Small Game hunting season are as follows: Squirrel, September 26th to December 15th; Cottontail rabbit October 21 to February 28th: Grouse September 28th to January 15th. There are minor changes from last year and the regulations are now available in printed form. Deer hunting is for a period of four days in this area, and the dates

November 2 to 5th and the application form can be obtained from the Ministry of Natural Resources Cambridge after September 1st. These must be returned by September 25th and the drawing will take place the week of September 28th. The successful applicants will be mailed out by October 9th.

Shot guns and Muzzel loaders only will be permitted and no dogs will be allowed Canadas largest floating boat show, Dockside '81 will be from September 17 to the 20th. This is the 10th annual and will host 150 exhibitors and probably welcome 25,000 visitors. Head on down to Ontario Place if you are interested




