A 47-year old Georgetown man was killed early yesterday (Thursday) when he was struck by a car white riding his bicycle on Guelph Street in Georgelown.

William Smeaton of Byron Street in Georgetown was rid-

ing his bike eastbound on the south shoulder of Guelph Street at approximately 6:30 a.m. when he was struck by a westbound car on Guelph Street at Armstrong Avenue.

Halton Regional police re-

ported that a 1975 blue Chevrolet Monza driven by 32-year old Jorge Vicente of Toronto crossed into the oncoming lane and drove on the opposite shoulder of the road, striking Mr. Smeaton. The victim was pronounced dead at the scene of the accident by Coroner Dr.

Ivan Hunter. Constable Robert Ustrzycki of 11 Division in Georgetown will be conducting an investigation into the accident.
