

Mayor announces new scheme

Permanent display will list centre's financial 'builders'

All who have contributed to the new Halton Hills Library and Cultural Centre will be acknowledged in a Book of Donations, which will be on permanent display in the foyer of the facility.

This was announced by Mayor Pete Pomeroy this week when he met with the special "action" sub-committee which was struck by Rex Heslop's overall fund-raising committee to raise community awareness as to the urgency for public funds.

Whereas every effort will be made by action sub-committee members to personally approach as many people as possible in the six weeks leading up to the official opening Oct. 18, it is hoped the campaign blitz will have a snowball effect.

We're no longer asking people to 'buy a pig in a poke', said publicity representative John Roe. "To all those who said 'We'll believe it

when we see it, the fund-raisers now say 'Come and take a look, and help us to put the campaign over the top'."

Mr. Roe said that in the next weeks when the finishing touches are applied, including much-needed landscaping, fund-raisers are hopeful that townspeople will realize just how important the new facility will be for the community's continued development.

"I guess I'm a hopeless optimist," he said, "but wouldn't it be great if the Book of Donations contained the names of everyone in this community...?"

The fund-raising thermometer edged up slightly past the halfway mark this week as pledges from the Chamber of Commerce (announced last week) and an, at present, anonymous donation of \$2,300

...one per cent of the overall campaign goal -- were officially recorded.

Prospective donors disappointed at not being able to purchase a seat-plaque (all sold out) still have an opportunity to have their "place in perpetuity" in the new theatre. Georgetown Rug Hookers, in collaboration with the Halton Hills Arts Council, have offered to hook two rug wall hangings, each containing a maximum of 50 names, to be a permanent display in the theatre auditorium. As with the plaques, the names inscribed may be those of the donors or in memory of others.

Town approval sought for fairgrounds hall

If approval is given by Halton Hills Council, the Georgetown Agricultural Society will be adding a \$12,000 addition to their building at the Fairgrounds.

The addition was approved at a society meeting Thursday, but whether the cement block building will be completed before this year's fair depends on the speed with which approval is given by council and whether the contractor's work can be completed by fair time, Oct. 2 and 3.

The building at the rear of the fairgrounds was originally built in 1952 as a horse barn, but when harness racing at the fair was discontinued, the building was remodelled into an exhibition hall for the showing of domestic science work, flowers and produce.

Lack of adequate indoor space has been a handicap to the Fair Board for many years, with the Armouries, for

which the board pays a rental fee, providing the only other accommodation.

Thursday's pot luck supper and meeting, held at the hall, was presided over by society president Joyce Gosling.

Many details were discussed for the fair's 1981 program, with Mona Milne outlining the program for Friday evening, when the official opening ceremony will be held and a performance will be put on by the Golden Helmets motorcycle precision team of the Ontario Provincial Police. The judging of the "Chocolate Dream" cake baking contest will also be held that night in the Armouries.

Mrs. Milne said a program of competitions and entertainment will be going on all day Saturday in the new Zeller's Tent. A local teenage rock band called "Shooz" will entertain in the tent both Friday evening and during the program Saturday afternoon.
