Rain keeps 'Jolly boys' off waters

Not a very pleasant weekend weather wise, but last Saturday the Salmon fleet was on the Lake although in lesser numbers.

The rain on Sunday kept the "Jolly boys" off the waters but the fishing was only fair.

That brings up another aspect of the booking of a charter boat skipper and crew. Do they supply rain gear, and some protection from squalls that spring up rapidly on Lake Ontario. Rain is beneficial to the shore fishermen.

The warm and scented (from the land) water runs far out into the lake and acts as an attractor to the fish and triggers the spawning urge and the subsequent run upriver. It may not be this last rain, but it all helps to set them off on the big run.

MIGHTY-MITE SERVICE

Bruce Campical runs a fine charter service and his 33 foot Chris Craft MIGHTY-MITE 111, is well equipped and provides lots of cover from the weather.

As with most charters all tackle is provided as most fishermen do not own the correct gear for these super fish. Bruce has the honor of running the boat that took the largest fish taken off St. Catharines in the spring derby. As" with all charters that I mention here in this column, you may tell them I recommended them, as I know or have fished with them all. Pappy Charters are now running more than one boat, Monty Smith and George Decator are two of the best skippers on the lake, and are almost sure to get you into fish. In fact last Saturday their boats did real well.

Some days on Lake Ontario, there are more trout than there are salmon, and the fishery for Rainbow, Brown and Laker's is growing with the Ministries swing to this type of fishery from the salmon.

PREPARE YOUR CATCH

How to prepare your catch: Take a 30 pound chinook, or a 15 pound coho, clean the prize and-but wait a minute. How to clean a fish that big? The Normark nine inch Rapala "big fish" filleting knife will fill the bill on that one. This knife is designed for this type of job and will hold an edge longer than any knife I have seen on the market.

There isn't one in my collection of knives, but I will remedy this before I get out for the salmon. Some time ago I mentioned the Berkley \$100,000 challenge. Berkley offered this amount to any other line company if they could beat them in a test of tensile strength

of their fishing line. There were no takers. Could it be the other companies were not interested in the money? Or could it be their lines were no match for the Berkley lines? Remember, I am just a reporter, and not an expert on lines. I only report what I see, and it looks like Berkley is a winner.






