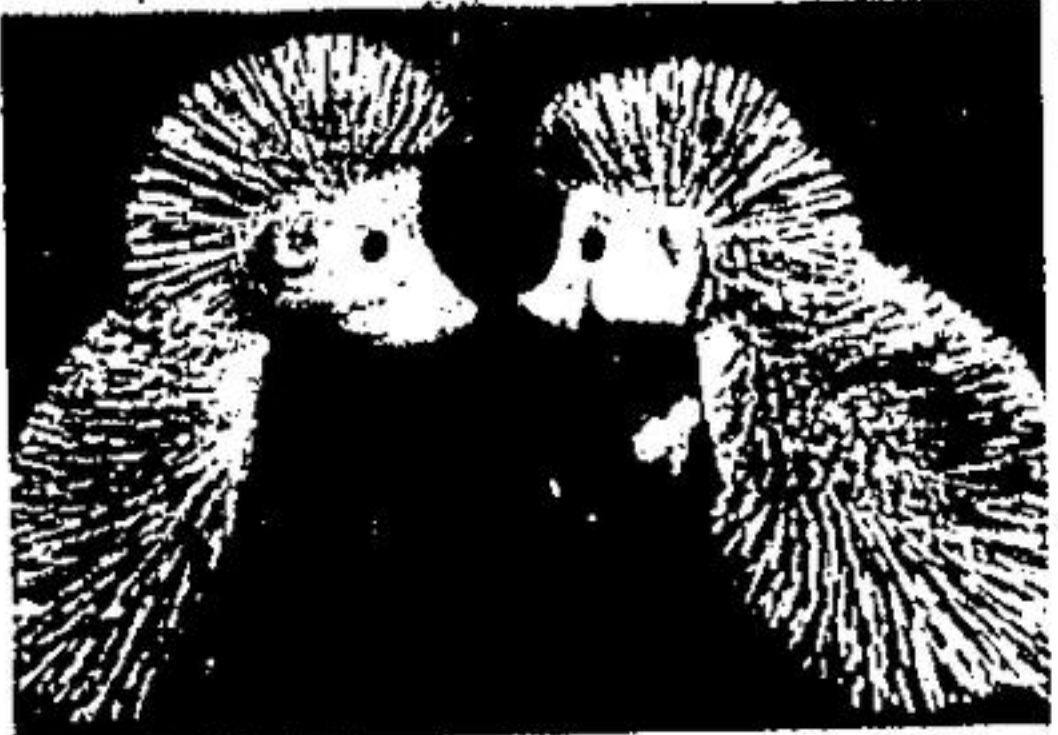


'Maud' in Not Now Darling dramatic shift for Marilyn

'Travellers' here Sept. 23

Halton Hills Arts Council proudly presents its first concert of the 1981-82 Musical Trillight Series featuring The Travellers - the world-famous Canadian folk singing group. The concert will take place at Sacre Coeur Hall, 39 Guelph Street, Georgetown, next Wednesday, (Sept. 23) at 8 p.m.

The Travellers, who date their real beginnings to the 1955 release of "This Land is Your Land", a song which has become a second national anthem. The song, Woody Guthrie's classic with Canadianized lyrics ("...from Bonavista to Vancouver Island...") has also been The Travellers' signature tune over the years.

The Travellers manage to play about 50 dates across Canada in a year and recently recorded their 15th album, Merry Go Round.

It may be the fact that their first interest has always been their love of the music they searched out and sang, rather than a need to commercialize it in order to live, that led The Travellers to their position of leaders in their field.

In the years since their first public appearances, The Travellers have lived up to their name. They have brought folk music of Canada to more Canadians than ever before, with songs of other cultures added to their repertoire to balance their concerts. They have played the finest concert halls in the country, the smallest to the largest colleges - even night clubs.

These days says Mr. Gray, "We just try to be honest to our material and I guess you could sum up our music in one word - Canadian."

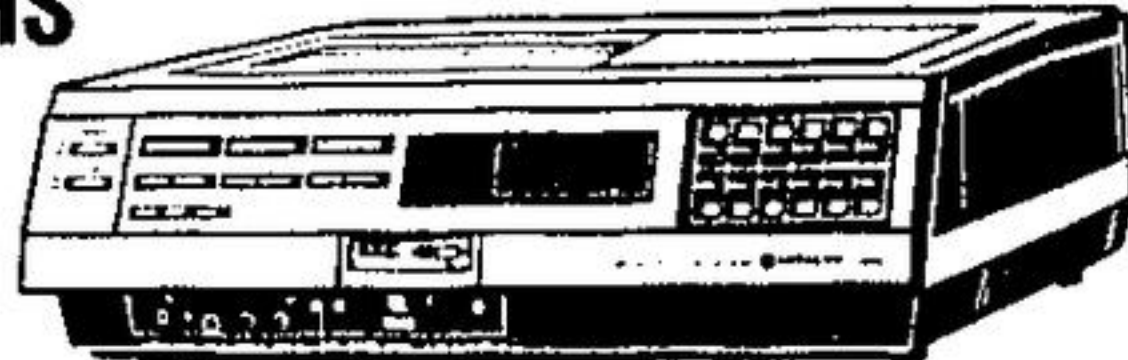

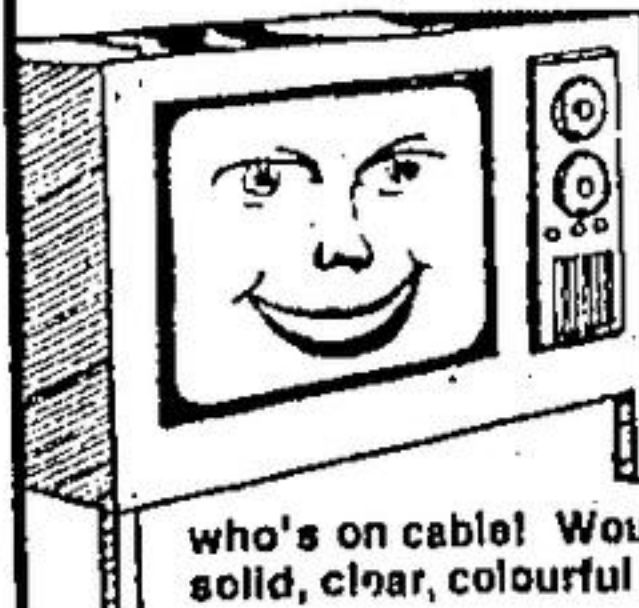

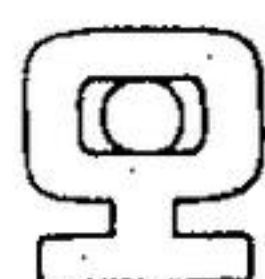

News for teachers

In order to improve board, staff and community relations, the Halton Board of Education voted Thursday to prepare and distribute an annual staff directory and a bi-annual newsletter.

The newsletters will cost about \$12,000 to print and mail and the staff directory about \$4,500.

The directory will be distributed to all board employees and trustees, and the newsletter to about 79,000 households in Halton.

The board considered creating a new position for a community relations officer to promote greater understanding between public and educators, but voted against it, saving about \$28,000.

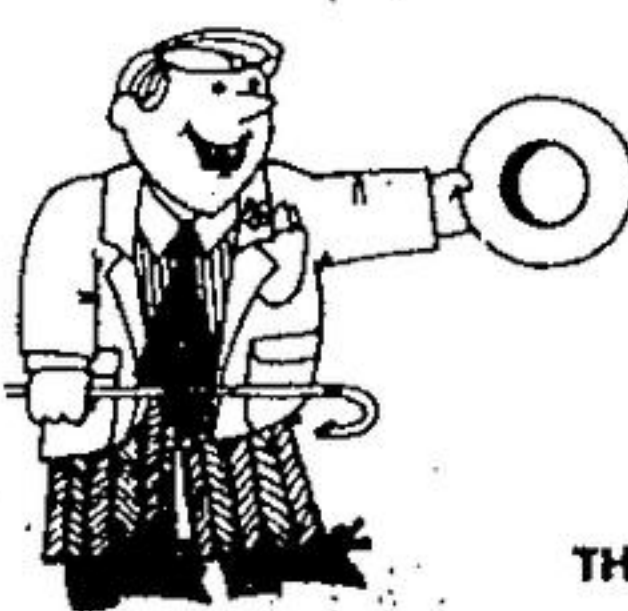
