Rolled oats as truck flips

Damage of \$15,000 to a tractor trailer truck occurred Sept. 3 when driver, Fred Bowen of RR4 Lindsay, attempted to round a corner and lost control. The truck fell sideways and emptied its cargo of oats onto Sideroad 15 at the Tenth Line.

Shopper fraud

A resident of Georgetown was charged with fraud and arrested when he appeared in court on another matter. On June 30 a man cashed a personal check for \$200 at an A and P store to pay in part for groceries. Subsequent investigations revealed no account existed.

Sheridan tools stolen

Sheridan Nurseries Ltd. in RR4 Georgetown had three tool boxes containing assorted mechanic's tools valued at \$5,000 stolen late Sept. 7 or early Sept. 8. Thieves used bolt cutters to gain entry to the south side of the garage.

Georgetown resident Richard Poot did his good deed Sept. 13 when he swerved to miss a dog while driving westbound on Wellington Road 42 in Acton. However, he caused \$1,000 damage to the left front corner of his 1966 Chevrolet.

Hound not so lucky

A female hound dog was less fortunate Friday when she was struck and killed instantly by motorcyclist Anthony Rouse of Wynford Drive in Acton. Mr. Rouse was driving northbound on Trafalgar Road when the dog entered the lane directly in front of him. After hitting the dog, his Yamaha bike rolled on its side and Mr. Rouse fell on the shoulder of the road. Mr. Rouse suffered minimal injuries and damages to his bike were \$700. The dog belonged to Peter Schoenmakers of RR2 Ashgrove.

Car wrecked, no injuries
