

Acton Sabres face top teams early

The Georgetown Gemins completed their opening game Sunday, but the Acton Sabres will have to wait until Friday when they open their season against Oakville, one of the league's top teams.

Coach Russiani plans for an exhibition game against Burlington Cougars this week, but the Sabres have been playing intra-squad matches instead of exhibition contests.

Meanwhile the swordsmen

have been finely-tuning their attacking machine with hard-hitting practices (attested to by the three players on the team who have received shoulder injuries from contact by their own teammates).

According to coach Jules Russiani, all 14 of the returning Sabres have now been signed and he's got two solid lines and six defencemen picked for his team thus far. Two players from the Guelph Platters have come to the team in the latter stages and he's still taking a look at their performances.

Goalending is one position the coach is still unsure of, because last year's stand-out, Wayne McDougall is practicing with the Platters and he could make their team. Meanwhile Russiani says he's pleased with the

three goaltenders still at camp, but he'll try not to commit himself to signing goaltenders until McDougall's position is clear.

Practice on the cement surface of the Acton arena ended with a ball hockey tournament for the Sabres where the players picked each team. Coach Russiani would still like to see the arena ice surface flooded earlier, as he feels the Sabres could use more ice time.

Happy to have them back and seeing them play with desire and maturity are players such as Denis Charbonneau, Dave McGilloway and Mike Monahan, the coach says. He's looking for Brampton, Streetsville and Oakville to be the powerhouse teams in the league this winter. Russiani is dis-

appointed he didn't get a chance to parlay for Georgetown defenceman John Barnes who was sent to Streetsville last week in a trade.

Watching the Gemini game last Sunday coach Russiani commented that Georgetown has some good diggers and if Mike McNeeney stays on the ice, he'll help the club and could be the backbone of their team.

Meanwhile former Sabre Glenn Murray was phoned just before press-time to receive instructions for what hockey camp to attend. Three teams are interested in Murray and he could end up in Baltimore, Toledo or Nashville. Because their season doesn't start until October 3, Murray has been in the area practicing with the Sabres.

Fish season not all over yet

Here is a timely item, regarding the belief of the North American Indian; "The simple, generally held belief in the 'great Manitou', the spirit of spirits, who left men and women free to decide how to behave themselves but thoughtfully provided earth, water, fire, and all animals for mankind's comfort and use-provided that certain hunting rituals are scrupulously observed." Basically this should still apply, yet it was written in the year 1880.

Fishing seasons are not all over yet. Most inland trout fishing closes today, Sept. 30th, but the Rainbow trout season on Lake Ontario and other big waters is open all year.

The same applies to Brown Trout so you still have lots of trout fishing available yet. Bass season closes on Nov. 30th in most areas, and even though the fishing has slowed down for Bass with the cold waters, they may still be taken.

Just fish slower, and make more use of bait or bottom crawling lures. Of course most fishermen know that Walleye fishing can be the best of the year now, but the same thing applies, fish slow. Muskie is HOT now and up to the end of the season, and the largest of the year are taken now by diligent muskie hunters.

The Great Salmon hunt is over for another year and I want to thank all those who expressed appreciation for the efforts to inform in this column. Details of the winners here next week, when I have more room, however Pete Mason was a winner in one of the "Mini-contests".

DUCKS ABOUND

The duck season is well opened, with more than the usual number of ducks around and more than the usual number of hunters. It seemed that everywhere a person went there were duck hunters. Not much danger to the ducks as most of them were "sky blasters" who do not know the range of their shot, or who had not practiced before the season started.

Finding a place to hunt is getting more difficult each year, I saw over 200 Canada Geese drop into a corn field above Hillsburgh. They just dropped in as a group and smashed the corn down with their concentrated mass.

This got them out of site as the standing corn surrounded them. When I asked politely for permission to hunt I was turned down with a flat NO. Sorry mister they will eat an awful lot of your corn.

FAMILY FARE

Lots of activities for the family as fall is well under way. The colours are great and the weather clear if cool. Korright Centre for Conservation has special days on Oct. 3, 4, 10, 11 and 12.

Movies, guest speakers will bring information on food co-ops in Ontario where the public is the beneficiary, and intensive discussion on organic gardening.

Corn husk doll making, cider making, cooking and other things will involve the whole family. Black Creek pioneer village will have apple paring and drying, printing, and candle dipping.

Mountsberg has a Pioneer apple festival with apple pancakes hot apple cider, and apple pressing. Watch how apple butter is made and then take in the film displays, slides etc. for a full days activities. Friday the TRAVELXPO comes to the Queen Elizabeth building at Exhibition place. This should interest all who are expecting to or would like to travel anywhere in the world.

Space does not permit details here but suffice it to say it is well worth a visit even for the armchair traveller.

The fishing that we take for granted here in Ontario would cost you dearly in England. A recent visitor to the home of Jim Bennett on Irwin Cres. in Georgetown dropped in to see me while here.

Mike Jones and his wife Jean hail from Gloucester where Mike is a builder. A "salmon beat" on a good river gives you a quarter mile to fish at a cost of 190 pounds sterling per day, Midweek.

A season costs 2000-3000 pounds and in three years Mike's friend took only one fish. Mr. Jones fishes the River Dart for Mullet in the 5-6 pound class with the occasional trout, and the season runs May to August.

As a keen fisherman Mike took time out to fish our salmon but the weather was so bad it made things difficult. The surprising thing to me was the "fishing clubs" in Gloucester.

For an Evening ticket with a two fish limit they ask 4 pound, 50 pence, and for the season April 1st to Sept. 30th the club asks 180 pounds sterling PLUS VAT which is Value Added Tax of 27 pounds.

Quite an expense to fish. Lets value our fishery more and do more to enhance it.

The year before McGilloway played for the Gemins and was their top scorer. He says he was treated well by Georgetown and he was thinking of returning there, but the fact that Jules Russiani was the Acton coach changed Dave's mind. McGilloway had played football with Jules and had immense respect for his coaching abilities.

Amidst the publicity of returning to Acton and being released by Georgetown to play for the Sabres, Dave stayed in the news with his prolific scoring abilities which resulted in one incident where he scored two goals in the same second; a debated World Record. The Guinness people have been informed of the feat but they have not made public their decision on the two goals.

The Sabres were playing Brampton and Dave had just scored his hat-trick when the Brampton coach started provoking the referee which eventually led to a penalty shot. Because the clock doesn't run during a penalty shot, Dave scored his fourth goal

of the night with 1:29 left on the clock.

Last season McGilloway adjusted quickly to the Sabre line-up and he was readily accepted by his new teammates. He proceeded to help the team by scoring 26 goals and 25 assists in 26 games. Dave felt good about returning to the home team and he noticed the respect Acton gained from playing well over the season.

"Like Glen Murray, this year Dave is helping the younger boys adjust; he wouldn't hide his knowledge," coach Russiani says.

The coach calls Dave a very strong-minded, dedicated co-operative member of the Sabres, one who might collect points into the 120 bracket.

Dave would like to gain a hockey scholarship after the season from a U.S. college and take sports or recreation-oriented courses in school. His goal for the coming season are for the team to improve from last year and he'd like to have a healthy season for himself.
