A parade around the track will officially open the fair's program. Special guests have been invited to the anniversary kick-off, including the famed Onlario Provincial Police "Golden Helmets", a precision 'team of police motorcyclists.

Diel-conscious fair goers can include in a little self-torture later that evening by popping over the fairgrounds armoury. For quite a few weeks now, the Georgetown agricultural society, organizers, of the fair, have been talking about the Chocolate Dream Cake" competition, sponsored by the Willlam Neilson Co. Ltd.
