

Gorin-McMullen marriage at St. George's

Reunion highlights local wedding

The reunion of two sisters who hadn't seen each other in 18 years and a special visit to the groom's hospitalized grandmother were among the highlights of the wedding of Stephanie Jane Gorin and Kenneth Paul McMullen Aug. 29, 1981, in Georgetown.

Reverend Graham Bland conducted the late afternoon double ring ceremony at St. George's Anglican Church, where pew ends were decorated for the occasion with white bows, white roses and pink carnations and the altar featured white gladiolus and pink, blue and white carnations.

Organist Jerry Van Wyck accompanied soloist Carol McCartney as she sang "With You I'm Born Again" and "What are You Doing the Rest of Your Life".

Stephanie Jane is the daughter of Hazel and Ken Gorin of Chelvin Drive in Georgetown. A graduate of Sheridan College's music theatre program, she works part-time for Romax Productions and continues her musical studies at Sheridan.
