The GDHS junior football team beat out White Oaks last Thursday to win their second straight game of the season, by a narrow margin of 8-6.

In the first home game for the Georgetown Rebels,

White Oaks scored the first touchdown late in the first quarter, but they failed on the convert attempt. Georgetown spent the rest of the half holding White Oaks to their six point lead.

The second half saw the Rebels come out fighting and by the end of the third quarter Blake Harrison scored the only Georgetown touchdown. Gary Morrow topped off the play by converting the extra point.

The final point of the game for the Rebels came from a touchback which rounded out

the scoring.

A player for the Rebels described the first half of the game to be very slow, as they held White Oaks to their lone touchdown.

The change during half time came about because they were talked into getting "psyched-up".

This second win in as many games equals the number of wins for last year's football team.

The Rebels have yet to play four more games, the next being Thursday at Oakville Trafalgar.



## Geminis' Bob Dean scores hattrick as club squeezes 6-6 tie with Milton

A Gemini Junior B goaltender best summed up last Sunday's home game against Milton after they tied 6-6. Steve Sullivan, who watched teammate Mike Steer face 13 shots to the Gemini's 4 shots on net in the third period said, "we tied as a team; next time we'll win as a team."

After starting out effectively in the first period, the Geminis gained a 5-3 lead at the end of the second period, then saw their lead diminish slowly in the third as the Flyers stormed back.

With the Gems lacking some defensive strength due to injuries, the locals were hard-pressed in their efforts to protect goaltender Mike Steer. Two juvenile-age players were called up to help, Ken Ward and Brian Ward, and the coach was pleased with their efforts saying, "they can play on any team anytime they want."

On the positive side to the tie was the outstanding play of forward Bob Dean who scored a hattrick for the Gems and was effective all night around the Milton net. Dean also assisted on both goals by Guy Cormier.

The line of Riv Kennedy, Kevin Franks and Bill Taylor sparked the Geminis early in the period with a goal by Kennedy to tie the game at 1-1. With five minutes remaining in the period Guy Cormier put the gems in front on a pass by Bob Dean but the Flyers came back to tie the game less than a minute later.

Early in the second period Bob Dean scored two consecutive goals three minutes apart to increase the team's lead and Cormier's power play effort from Brian Ward and Dean seem to indicate the Flyers were weakening.

But it was the Gems who fell asleep in the third,

willing to rest on their 5-3 laurels. Dean scored the lone Gemini goal in the third period assisted by Brad McMeekin, but the rest of the period belong to Milton.

**CAME BACK**  
When Milton came back midway through the third period with two goals the Gems failed to regroup and let the Flyers constantly bombard a harrowed Mike Steer in net.

After the game, a disgruntled Gem coach Dave Switzer said there would be severe changes made in the team's lineup. He was impressed with the two Ward boys, Brian and Ken (they're not related) and praised Bob Dean who "plays every game with heart, soul, everything."

The coach could see that last place Milton wanted their first win in five starts. The tie puts Georgetown in fifth place in the Central

Junior B standings. He's again pleased with the fan support the town has given the team.

The Geminis Ed Dwyer who watched the game from the sidelines because of a shoulder injury said the team did too much running around and they were too over-confident. Alternate captain Dwyer says his doctor told him to stay away from hockey for six weeks with a separated shoulder, but he'll be back with the team next week, three weeks earlier than the six week deadline.

Injuries have put one player from each line out of action, said general manager Bob Tost. Bob Morrow has a torn back muscle and cannot play while Mike McMenemy has a shoulder injury and did not play last Sunday also. Chris Peavoy missed the

game due to a suspension earlier in the week. Import Mike Corbly from New York is reported to have found work after returning home to the States and GM Tost said he probably won't be back to the Geminis.

Captain Bill Taylor refuses to sit on the sidelines although suffering from a number of various ailments. Coach Switzer had some happy news to offset Sunday's results when he announced Lance Doucette had been signed by the Geminis and his presence could help Tier 2 hockey for Bellville and last year he was with the Brampton Warriors.

Last week the Geminis played Oakville and were blasted 6-2 by their opponents.

# Raiders chisel at Collingwood defense

The long-awaited rematch between the top two teams in the Intermediate A league from last season commenced last Friday night with the local Georgetown Chrysler Raiders finding some third period weaknesses in Collingwood's defence in a final 10-5 trouncing.

The Raiders and the Shipbuilders went head-to-head in the first two periods, but a seven-goal barrage by the Georgetown forwards overwhelmed Collingwood in the final period.

If it hadn't been for the excellent goaltending of Collingwood's Brad Steel, the score might have been greater as he stopped 40 Raider shots over the course of the game, 15 shots in the second period alone.

Six minutes into the first period Collingwood took the lead and it took the Raiders almost the entire period to tie the game. Juri Kudrasov netted the Raiders opening goal with 1:22 left in the period on passes from Rick Kessell and Ray Tonelli.

Georgetown started the second period quickly with Ray Tonelli collecting his first two goals for the night less than one minute into the period from Juri Kudrasov and Rick Kessell.

Midway through the period winger Gary McFadyen scored on a power play effort with assists from Ron Twiss and Steve Lyon. Collingwood fired their lone second period goal five minutes into the period to make the score at the end of the period 2-1 for the Raiders.

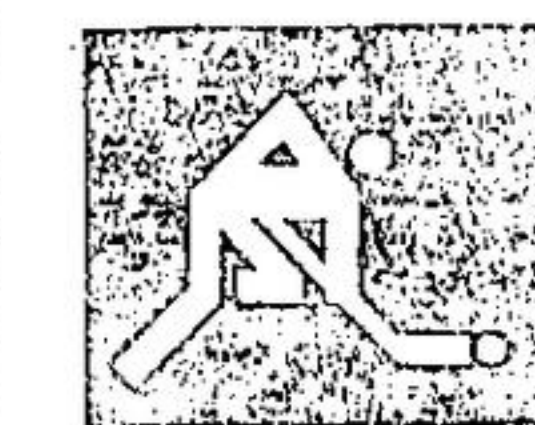
Gary Ford increased the lead for the Raiders in the third period on his goal on passes from John Cook and Peter Sturgeon which forced

Collingwood to open up and take greater chances in order to get back in the game.

**FOUR MORE**

A minute later Collingwood scored to make it 4-3. However, for the next ten minutes the Raiders scored four consecutive goals on Shipbuilder netminder Brad Steel to take the wind out of their opponents' sails. John Cook scored his first of two goals mid-way through the period on passes from Steve Lyon and Gary Landry.

Then veteran Gary Ford made the score 6-3 on his goal from Steve Lyon and Bill Hamilton. John Cook then added another assisted by



Ford. Gary McFadyen increased the lead to 8-3 with his second goal effort of the game on a pass from Rick Kessell.

After Ron Twiss scored again to add to the embarrassment, the Shipbuilders got back into the game with two quick goals to narrow the Raider lead to 9-5. However, Ray Tonelli let Collingwood know the Raiders wouldn't let down with a goal as 24 seconds left were showing on the clock.

After the game, Raider coach Gerry Inglis said he thought Collingwood's offence would be tough after the way they played Owen Sound and Barrie earlier in the season.

He thought with the youth on the Collingwood squad, their players would play an aggressive, fast game, but with Juri Kudrasov and Gary Ford playing in top form for the local side after playing summer hockey for the past four months, the Raiders had their share of fast-skaters too, he said.

**STRONGER**

"I would have to say we're a stronger team than last year," Inglis said. The addition of Peter Sturgeon and his playmaking and back-checking abilities has helped the team plus a healthy Juri Kudrasov has made the difference, he said. Also players like Gary Ford and Gary McFadyen are really putting their best out for the team, Inglis said.

Goaltender Brad Miller was forced to make some key saves during the game and coach Inglis praised his performance. Although only tested with 17 shots on goal over the period of the game, Inglis said Miller made some good saves in the first and second periods to keep the Raiders on top of the scoreboard.

Although wanting to move forward Ron Twiss from his present defensive position, coach Inglis said, he "wouldn't trade Leaf's Salming for Twiss on defence."

Collingwood's goaltender played a sure game for the Shipbuilders and coach Daryl Sly could have some changes in mind for next Tuesday's encounter with Collingwood.

"I don't know what Daryl's thinking, but he's got a balanced club and if he gets the team motivated, it will take a pretty good club to beat them," says Inglis.

## Swim siblings part company

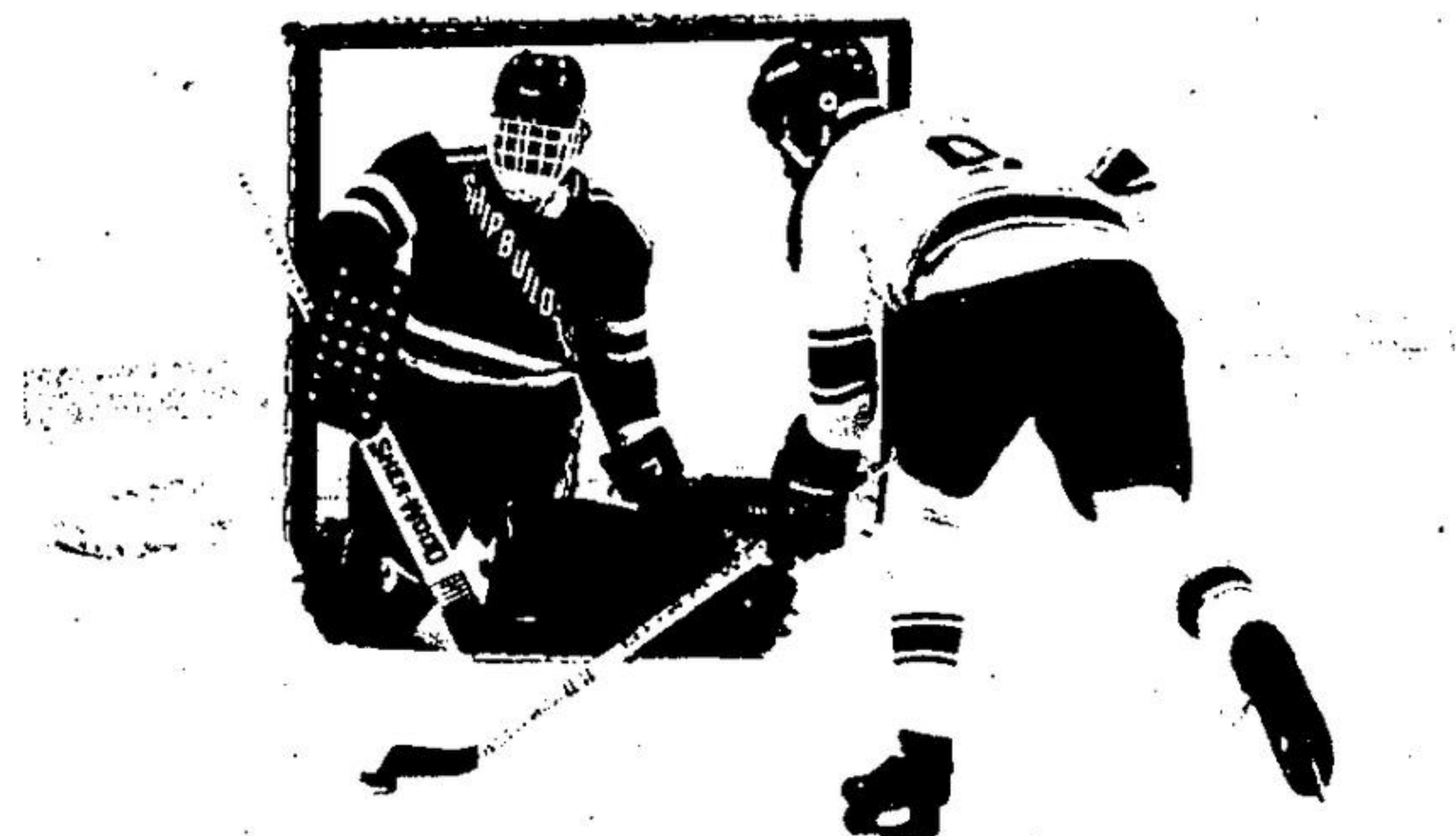
With the firing of Head coach Trevor Tiffany from the Etobicoke swim club, Georgetown swimming stars Rob and Sue Masson have decided to part company.

While in grade 13 last year Bootle won the senior boys all-round gymnastics event, placing first in the pommel, vault and second on the parallel bars. Now Dave is finishing off two high school credits while he boards in Toronto with one of the York University coaches.

He is going to Newtonbrook Secondary school during the day and then he practices three hours a day with the York team, six days a week. Any free time he has is spent doing homework, he said in an interview last week.

Dave plans to attend York University in Fine Arts after Christmas and then he will be able to compete with the team against other Universities in competition. He says his routines have improved and he is learning a lot from the individual coaching and excellent facilities.

However, because of his unfortunate broken leg during the beginning of the track and field season last Spring, the injury has held him back from vaulting and tumbling at full strength.

According to Dave, the bone was never set properly and his chiropractor says even if the leg heals in a bent position, it could end up strengthening itself eventually.

If the leg continues to bother him, Dave will have the leg re-broken to correct the problem. Right now the leg is at 75 per cent, he said.

That pretty well describes the relations between Glen Williams and Delrex. Good friends off the field, they pull no punches on it.

In the final regular season game for both clubs Sunday, the Glen came out and took it to the Smokers from the beginning, rolling up a 18-12 third quarter lead behind outstanding defence and a fired up offense.

In fact the Glen were threatening to leave Delrex behind when the Smoker defence wrenched the momentum away with key interceptions by Tim Tolton and Bruce Cartwright.

Given the breaks he needed, Bob Inglis cashed them in and carried Delrex to an eventual 33-15 win.
