Collingwood's Tim Colley helps team blast past Raiders in 10-6 win

Three goals and three assists by Collingwood's Tim Colley proved to be one of the dominating factors in the Shipbuilder's victory over the Georgetown Chrysler Raiders last Tuesday in their 10-6 win.

Earlier in the week, Georgetown hosted Collingwood and blasted them out of the arena in the third period for a 10-5 score. But the roles were reversed who Collingwood had the home ice advantage.

Much talk has been made of the Shipbuilder's new acquisitions, especially the Colley brothers, Tim and Tom. Tom Colley Is 5'8", 184, centremen and is 28 years of age. Last year he played with the Binghampton Whalers of the AHL after six years with the New Haven Night Hawks.

The three players who formed one line with the Brampton Warriors last year have all signed with the Collingwood Shipbuilders. Their names are Tim Colley who had 39 goals with the Warriors last season, Dave Payne, who had 41 goals and Gregg Scarlett who had 43 goals last year.

The Shipbuilders have now won five games, their only loss coming to Georgetown last Friday night. Before being defeated by Georgetown, Collingwood downed Midland 4-2.


