

Try Herald's writing contest

Here are the contest rules:

Ontario Outdoors

Controlled hunt areas decreasing

Wildlife Management areas in Ontario may be the only place left to hunt in Ontario in the near future.

Lots of folk seem to think that they have a duty to convince everyone else to put up no trespassing signs on their property. Usually, these indicators are not property owners themselves, but simply anti-hunters trying new tactics.

While checking Ministry listings, it has become apparent that even these controlled areas are becoming fewer. With the help of organized hunting and fishing clubs, under the auspices of the Ontario Federation of Anglers and Hunters, we can get some of these areas saved and even some of them returned.

When looking for a place to hunt or fish, check the M.N.R. for the area closest to your intended hunt area, and try to pick up a copy of the booklet entitled "Wildlife Management areas in Ontario".

Work through the Ministry and the OFAH and try to get more areas opened to sportsmen. One of our tasks will be to police our own ranks, by reporting those persons who give the rest of us a bad name. Anyone snagging fish, which becomes prevalent at this time of the year should be reported to the nearest Ministry of Natural Resources Officer or OPP officer. Rather than use bad language I will refrain from saying what I think of snaggers, but use your imagination for the scum of the fishing world.

DISRUPTERS
Watch out for Hunt Disrupters. These people will be out in force as another means of spoiling the Deer Hunt in Halton. Some of these folk may be local, but quite likely a lot of them will be the so called "friends of animals" and they will do their best to prevent sportsmen from getting their deer.

If you encounter any of these destroyers, report them to the police as they are breaking the law. The hunt opposition talks about "our wildlife", and fail to recognize that hunters are taxpayers and citizens and Canadians and Ontarians as well, and as such have rights also. These rights would of course mean "their wildlife".

Three more hunter safety courses will be held at Cold Creek Conservation area. The dates are Oct. 20, 22, 24, 25, Nov. 18, 19, 21, 22, Nov. 24, 26, 28, 29. All weekend sessions are from 7:30 p.m. to 10:30 p.m. and the weekends are 10 a.m. to 3 p.m.

Pre-registration is essential and can be made by calling 661-6600 extension 286. The fee of \$23 must be paid in advance, and Cold Creek is located between Bolton and Nobleton on Concession Road 11 north of King Side Road.

Kortright Centre for Conservation will feature a Decoy Exhibit from now until Nov. 8th. This will be daily from 10 a.m. to 4 p.m. and includes some excellent samples of the decoy art.

Kortright is located 3 km west of Hwy. 400, just south of Major Mackenzie Drive on Pine Valley Drive. The big news is well spread now, but in case you have not heard, the Moon River Basin has produced another "monster muskie". This one fell to a luckily presented lure, and the fish weighed in at 55 pounds.

MUSKIE SEASON
The muskie season is open for a while yet and the best fishing of the year is still ahead as these fish like to add fat for the winter. Try large hures such as the new magnus Rapala's and fish the shoal areas, where the muskie likes to hunt.

Fishing could be better than hunting for ducks from now on. The snow and freezing weather could have your favourite duck water frozen and the ducks deserted. Moving water freezes last and could be the best spot to look for waterfowl that still hold in the area.

Georgetown Anglers and Hunters will hold another Turkey Shoot on October 25th from 11 a.m. to dusk. Lots of opportunities to get in a shot for a bird, and the fun of watching and meeting with fellow hunters is always worth the time out to these shoots.

Funds are always put to good uses at the club, and your support is welcome. Any further news of turkey shoots in the area would be welcomed.
