## GDHS graduation recalls educational 'milestone'

The entire ceremony was a model of conciseness, lasting barely an hour and a half. And throughout, the high school band performed, sporting handsome new deep blue

An unexpected presentation during the ceremony, which was followed by a banquet for the graduates and their guests, saw long-time GDHS teacher John Todd receive the Kent Korzack Memorial Award. After three years of failing to choose what it considers a worthy recipient, the school's student council chose to recognize Mr. Todd's efforts in promoting extra-curricular






